

FRANCE MOVES TO FIX BUDGET TO PAY DEBT

Socialists Win Attack Upon Financial Program When Caillaux Weakens to Prevent Another Cabinet Crisis Franc Takes Drop.

PARIS, June 5.—The cabinet crisis, apparently threatened early today, seemed postponed when Finance Minister Caillaux partially surrendered to the socialists' attacks upon his financial program.

The attacks were conducted by former Finance Minister Louis Loucheur and by socialist leaders at a peace conference with the government and the left bloc of the chamber, called by Premier Painleve to harmonize opposition to the Caillaux financial program.

At first the attitude of M. Loucheur and the socialists seemed irreconcilable with that of M. Caillaux. The impasse was maintained during the greater part of a three hour discussion, but finally when M. Loucheur took the floor the finance minister weakened somewhat and compromised.

M. Caillaux insisted that the balancing of the budget came first, while M. Loucheur and the socialists maintained that financial reforms must precede a budget equilibrium. M. Caillaux, however, emphatically rejected the socialists' demand for a capital levy.

One of M. Caillaux's main arguments was that "the United States is just now greatly interested in our situation," and that the best way to secure a satisfactory settlement of France's debt to the United States would be for France to balance her budget and even to make her receipts exceed expenditures.

M. Caillaux after hearing the arguments of M. Loucheur, agreed to attempt to balance the budget and to "rehabilitate" French finances simultaneously.

This "rehabilitation," although described in general terms, was taken to mean the inauguration of various measures leading to the refunding of the internal debt and the stabilizing of the franc.

LONDON, June 5.—The French franc weakened on the foreign exchange market this morning and reached 100 francs 5 centimes to the pound sterling.

There has been a persistent selling of francs in exchange here since recent suggestions were made regarding the payment by European countries of the debts to the United States and also since nervousness has been felt over the Moroccan situation.

Belgian francs also weakened to 102 francs 25 centimes to the pound sterling.

CHICAGO, June 5.—(By Associated Press.) After nearly a week of continued torrid weather the middlewest today gave up hope of an immediate drop in temperature. Having yesterday withdrawn his prediction of showers throughout this territory as far west as the Rockies, the weather man again posted the familiar summer forecast—"continued warm," for virtually all central states.

He said that possibly there would be local showers in Iowa, Minnesota, Nebraska and Wisconsin, but indicated that they would not bring any appreciable change in temperature.

The heat fatality toll jumped every hour. Chicago led the country in the number of deaths attributed to the sun's rays. Since Wednesday noon twelve persons have died here.

In sharp contrast, the far west was much cooler. A four-inch snowfall in Montana although causing damage to trees and other foliage in Great Falls before it melted, improved crop prospects generally.

Boise, Idaho, with an altitude of less than 3000 feet, had a killing frost yesterday and a minimum temperature of 36 degrees. Although vegetables suffered, no damage was reported to fruit, leading product of that area.

CHICAGO, June 5.—(A. P.)—As a result of a report showing that approximately 150 more deaths between May 30 and June 4 in Chicago than for the same period last year, which was largely attributed to the heat wave by Health Commissioner Hurdson, the commissioner today issued an appeal to ice companies for free ice for the poor. A majority of the increased deaths were those of infants.

ST. LOUIS, June 5.—(By Associated Press.) The intense heat prevalent throughout the section indirectly caused the death of one person and prostration of three others here yesterday and today.

DETROIT, June 5.—(By Associated Press.) Two more deaths from heat in Michigan were reported today, bringing to nine the number of fatalities in the state. Seven more prostrations also were reported, several of the victims, aged persons, being reported in serious condition.

NEW YORK, June 5.—(By Associated Press.)—At the end of the fifth day of record-breaking June heat the death toll in the eastern states stands at 71, including drownings.

Mounting to new high marks for June, the heat wave yesterday killed 24 persons and indirectly caused the deaths of 12 others.

NEW STRUCTURE WILL BE BUILT ON PAGE CORNER

The work of building another new business structure on the so-called old Page theater corner lot, corner of Main and Riverside and adjoining the old theatre ruins, was begun this week, making the second business structure in that locality to be built by E. C. Jerome, whose first building facing Riverside near the corner and now near completion will very soon be occupied as the new home of the Auto Supply and Parts company.

The new structure is being erected facing Main street on the second lot east from the corner of Riverside, and will be 29 feet wide and 87 1/2 feet deep. It will be a one-story concrete building with full basement and handsome front. R. L. Stewart is the builder, and the structure will be ready for occupancy in July.

It will be the new home of the Modern Sheet Metal and Plumbing company located at 12 North Fir street for the past two years, that concern having obtained a long time lease, hence is being constructed with original designs for the special use of this rapidly growing company, to meet its constant expansion needs.

The Modern Sheet Metal and Plumbing company first came into existence five years ago in the Sparta building with H. C. Williamson and A. Tye as the original owners and working staff. Three years ago John S. Erickson purchased the interest of Mr. Tye, and then he and Mr. Williamson moved the establishment to its present location where a working staff of eleven men has long been employed.

There will be genuine regret on North Fir street when this company moves to its new location, as its personnel have been good neighbors and furnished this section of the street with good drinking water from a street fountain in front of their establishment. Emil Mohr for School Director

For several weeks there has been a quiet discussion among those interested in school affairs, as to the best man available for the position of superintendent of the school board to succeed Dr. L. D. Phipps whose term expires June 15th.

Several good and capable men have been suggested and interviewed, but Emil Mohr, proprietor of the Hotel Medford has been the most often and favorably mentioned.

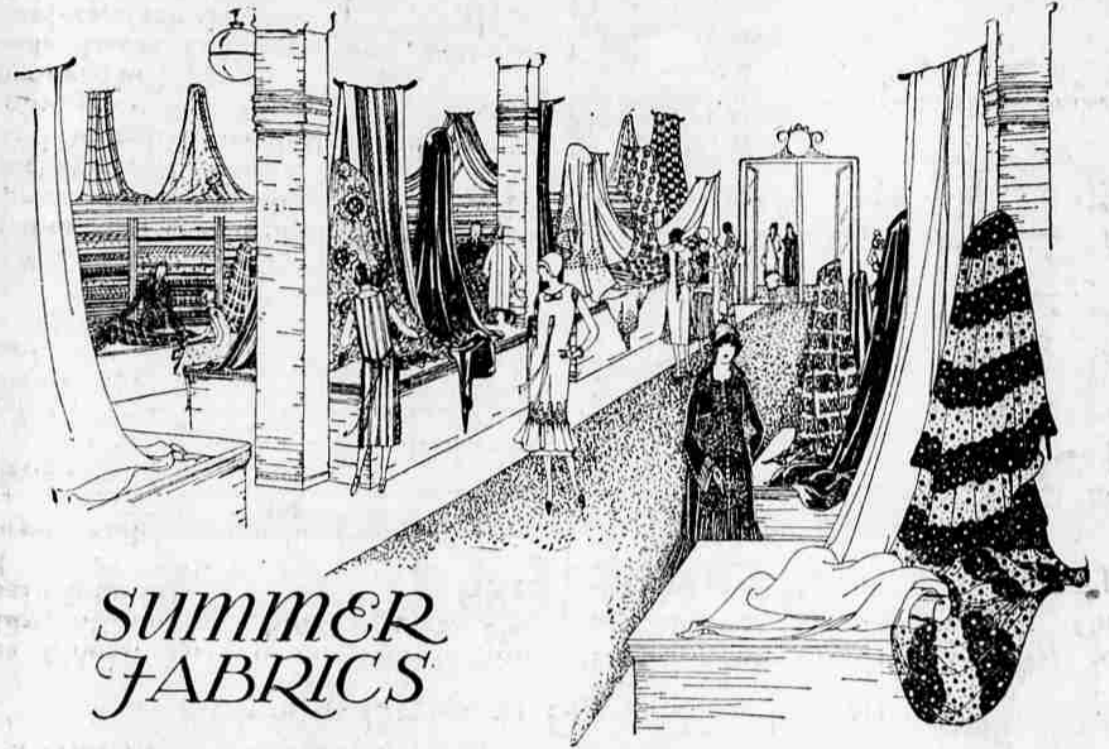
