WASHINGTON, June 6.—(By Associated Press.) President Coolidge faced a busy morning disposing of a variety of details requiring his attention before his departure in mid-afternoon today for Minnesota to deliver an address Monday at the Norwegian-American centennial. He expects to be back at his desk here Wednesday morning.

Accompanied by Mrs. Coolidge, Secretary and Mrs. Kellogg, whose residence is in St. Paul and Senator Leconte of Wisconsin, the president will make the entire journey, his longest since entering the White House, in a special section of a regular train.

Although inclined to travel as he did on a trip last winter to Chicago on a regular train, the president accepted the suggestion of railroad officials that it would be in the interest of operating safety and efficiency to use a special section.

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SURVEY STARTS BY STRAHORN ON NEW KLAMATH RAILROAD

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., June 6.—Announcement was made here last night by Robert E. Strahorn, president of the Oregon, California and Eastern railway, that surveys have started on the projected Modoc-Northern line, looking toward its possible construction to Malin, about 30 miles south and east of Klamath Falls. A party of engineers was put in the field yesterday to re-locate this line.

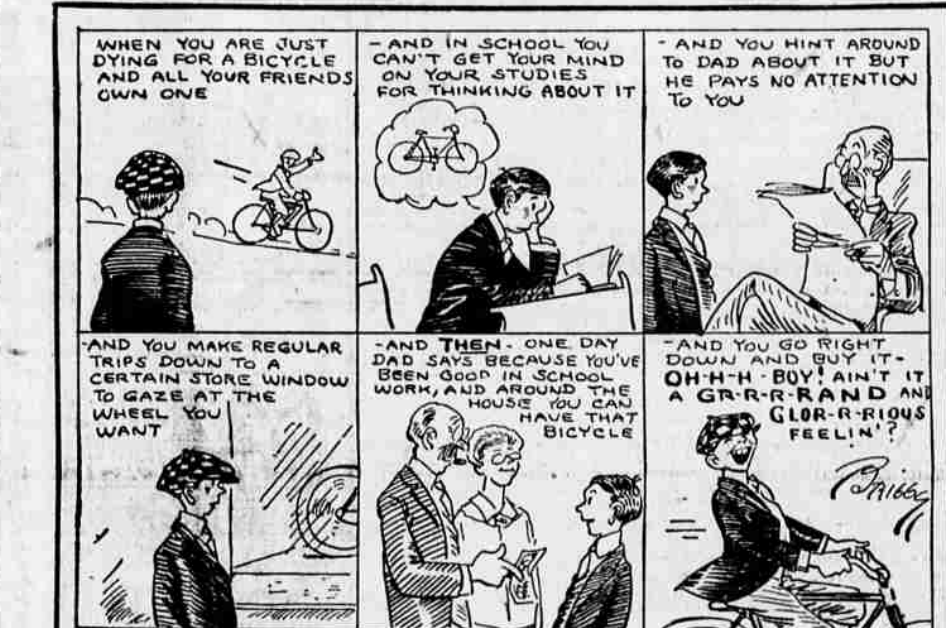
At the same time Mr. Strahorn made public the fact that the Southern Pacific has likewise provided the needed funds for the construction of the Strahorn road from Sprague River to Silver Lake.

Both projected developments, he pointed out, are dependent upon permission being granted by the inter-state commerce commission. The Modoc Northern, if constructed, would tap nearly 350,000 acres of fertile farm land in this county, most of which is now under water or is being put under water.
