

RUSH FINAL WORK ON CAMP JACKSON FOR ENCAMPMENT

The entire number of officers and squad tents have been erected at Camp Jackson in preparation for the Oregon National Guard encampment to be held there June 12th till 25th.

Major General George A. White is expected to arrive in the city either today or tomorrow to give Camp Jackson a final inspection before the arrival of the brigade.

Friday, the day of the arrival of the soldiers, will be utilized in establishing camp. Saturday will be the day of inspection of all equipment.

Officers of the United States army will be present on the day designated for the inspection of the 22nd brigade on dress parade, which will take place on the camp grounds.

Already many reservations have been made at the local hotels by officers and their families during their stay in the city while the encampment is in progress.

Sunday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock Copco will take on the strong local national guard team at the Holly street grounds.

CHICAGO, June 6.—Al Simmons, a one-time bush leaguer, for whom Connie Mack, wily manager of the Athletics is reported to have parted with \$25,000, today has a value of at least \$75,000 to Mack.

Simmons, breaking loose in the general hitting commotion prevailing in the American league, garnered twenty hits in his last nine games, giving him the batting leadership with an average of .415.

Harry Rice of St. Louis also has been a hitting sensation, but as he has only figured in twenty games, his average of .412 does not compare in importance to several other figures.
