GIBBONS REFUSES TO QUIT, WANTS A RETURN MATCH

ST. PAUL, Minn., June 8.—Tommy Gibbons returned to his home here late last night from New York and declared he would seek a return match soon with Gene Tunney of New York, who knocked out the St. Paul veteran in the twelfth round Friday night. Tommy said he would rest about a month before plunging again into his quest of the world's heavyweight boxing championship. The first knock-out of his career has "not" convinced him that he is through as a successful fighter, the St. Paul boxer said. "I do not think I have gone back a single step," Gibbons asserted. "I plan to rest for a month and then to ask Tunney for a return match. I want to test myself once more and then if I fall I shall retire. But I would never be satisfied to quit now. "I fought a bad fight against a good man." As soon as Gibbons alighted from the train here he hurried to a local hospital where Mrs. Gibbons has been seriously ill. Worry over her condition is believed by many of his friends here to have been responsible for Tommy's poor showing against Tunney.

JACK KEARNS AFTER MATCH WITH GREB

NEW YORK, June 8.—(A. P.)—Jack Kearns, manager of Jack Dempsey and Mickey Walker, reached New York last night from California and announced he expected to second the welterweight champion against Harry Greb in their middleweight championship fight at the Polo grounds on June 19. Kearns never has obtained a license in New York as either a manager or trainer, so that he will have to appear before the boxing commission.

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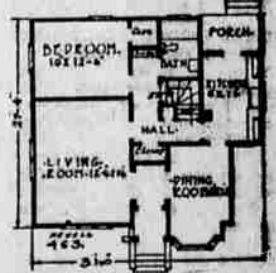
A Charming and Economical Little English Cottage Solves the Rent Problem
