JOE McMAHON IS BUSY AGAIN ON SPEEDER'S TRAIL

Traffic Officer J. J. McMahon, now a sergeant of the state traffic squad, after a week's absence, is again on the job gathering up auto traffic violators, one of the results of which is that Harry Werts, young man of this vicinity, on his plea of guilty in Judge Taylor's court here yesterday to speeding at 55 miles an hour over the Crater Lake highway last Sunday, was fined \$25 and had his driver's license suspended for thirty days.

Robert Wolfers of San Francisco, arrested for speeding on the Pacific highway last Saturday was reported as having forfeited the \$30 cash bail he put up with Sergeant McMahon, following his arrest on that charge.

This bail was taken under the state law, which recently went into effect and which permits a state traffic officer to take cash bail of not less than \$25 or more than \$100, according to the gravity of the offense charged, on holidays or under other circumstances when the accused non-resident cannot be brought into court for trial within a day or so, without great personal inconvenience.

Inasmuch as court was not in session following the San Francisco man's arrest and the courts are not in session on Sunday, McMahon accepted \$30 cash bail, and then Wolfers apparently went on about his business.

Under the old state law, the traffic officer could only hold an accused man's car as security or accept bail of \$100, the amount of the maximum fine for an auto law violation.
