

# BELIEF SHIP IS NEARING PLACE FOR AIR SEARCH

ABOARD S. S. INGETRE, June 10.—(By Associated Press.) (Wireless.) At 9:30 this morning the Ingetretre, carrying the Norwegian government's Amundsen relief expedition, was proceeding toward Spitzbergen at her maximum speed of 10 1/2 knots per hour.

The seaplanes F-18 and F-22 were slung across the deck ready for service whenever needed. They will be used in searching for the missing explorers who started for the north pole from Spitzbergen in two flying boats May 21.

The Ingetretre spent two hours taking on supplies at Bergen, a Norwegian harbor 130 miles northwest of Oslo.

The airmen who are to pilot the seaplanes in search of Amundsen are quiet, virile Norwegians, whose constant thought is the hope of rescuing Amundsen—although they admit that to find him now would be a tremendous piece of luck.

Lieutenant Lutz Holm, leader of the aviators told the Associated Press that his intention was to reconnoiter along the edge of the arctic ice pack to the northeast of Dane's Island. Lieutenant Holm's assumption is that if Amundsen is returning from the pole toward his original base, he will naturally make for the nearest land which would be the so-called Northeastland, or Spitzbergen archipelago.

# STUDENTS TRY TO SOLVE AXE MURDER CASE

BATON ROUGE, La., June 10.—(A. P.)—Efforts by police and detectives having failed so far to solve the mysterious axe killing here Sunday of Oscar B. Turner, instructor in agronomy at Louisiana State university, students of the school of agriculture today began an investigation into the slaying on their own initiative.

What methods the students will pursue in their attempts to unravel the puzzling circumstances surrounding the crime were not revealed although it is understood that among the hundreds of young men and women attending the university, one youth is under close surveillance by both authorities and classmates.

The coroner's jury which has held two sessions in a prolonged inquest into the killing and has examined a number of students and other persons connected with the college without making recommendations, adjourned last night, but will resume the inquiry today.

The slaying, marking the first day of the last week of the present scholastic term, has upset the entire institution, despite efforts of the faculty to continue classes and examinations.

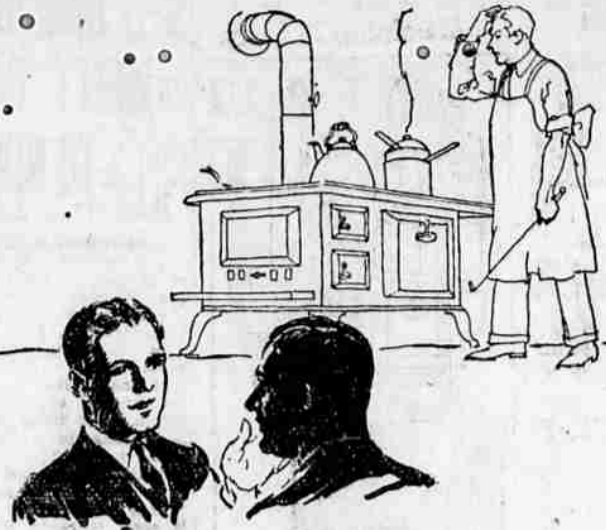

# EUGENE PROPOSES TO BOND ITSELF FOR S. P. STATION

EUGENE, Ore., June 10.—(Proposal to bond the city of Eugene for \$175,000 to acquire a tract of 200 acres northwest of here, that will be used as a municipal railroad terminal on which will be erected terminal facilities for the railroad company in this territory, if the Southern Pacific Railway company accepts the offer, was announced last evening at a meeting of the city council and the chamber of commerce.

The city council set the date of the election on the \$175,000 bond issue for Tuesday, August 18.

On the land, if the proposal goes through, would be invested approximately \$500,000 in a tie-treating plant, \$1,500,000 in steel for switching yards and in other purposes and other additional sums in extension of present shop equipment, it is said.

# 3 NEGROES HELD IN GIRL KILLING

NEW YORK, June 10.—(Associated Press.) With three negroes held in jail in connection with the murder of Florence Kane, sister of a detective, police still are uncertain as to the identity of the slayer.

One of the negroes, a long-armed giant, William Brassfield, apartment house janitor, is accused of homicide. The case against him is that he served seven years for attacking and robbing a woman ten years ago; that he was identified by two young women as the man who accosted or attacked them at or near the vacant lot where Miss Kane's battered body was found six days ago; that he was a friend of Frank Kelly, a negro executed for slaying two women in 1919; and that he wore cotton gloves about his work.

Miss Kane was strangled. Other young Brooklyn women who were attacked by a negro agreed that he had unusually long arms.

# PARENTS BLAMED FOR CRIME WAVE

DENVER, Colo., June 10.—(A. P.)—The rising generation with its reputed connection with crime, is not wholly to blame for laxity of law observance, Juvenile Judge Ben B. Lindsey, founder of the juvenile court, declared in an address here last night before the International Association of Police Women.

The jurist censured modern-day parental influence as a breeder of crime and said if adults exercised their potent influence for good over youth, there would be far fewer graduates from juvenile detention institutions into penitentiaries.

Criticism of the modern prison system was voiced by Dr. George W. Kirchwey, former professor of Columbia university and ex-warden of Sing Sing prison.

The imprisonment system, he declared, brought about contact of the "hardened criminal" with the first offense prisoner, causing "contamination of crime."

# Decisions of U. S. Supreme Court

WASHINGTON, June 8.—(A. P.)—The government today asked the supreme court for permission to file petitions for rehearings in the maple flooring and cement manufacturers' cases in which the court a week ago sustained the trade association method of co-operation in industries.

WASHINGTON, June 8.—The right of the court of customs appeals to reverse decisions of the board of general appraisers was upheld today by the supreme court.

The principle was applied on deciding several cases, all similar to that brought by the government against O. B. Fish of New York City.

WASHINGTON, June 8.—(By Associated Press.) The supreme court today refused to pass on the constitutionality of the New York building zone law.

WASHINGTON, June 8.—(By Associated Press.) A federal district court cannot compel a person living in another district to appear as a witness before the railroad labor board, the supreme court decided today in the case of D. B. Robertson of Ohio, a railroad brotherhood official.

The federal district court at Chicago ordered Robertson, who is head of the firemen and engineers to appear before the board in Chicago. Robertson challenged the jurisdiction of the court contending that it did not have authority to haul him to Chicago from his home in Cleveland.

WASHINGTON, June 8.—(By Associated Press.) As a part of its campaign to rid its docket of worthless cases the supreme court announced today it would scrutinize more carefully hereafter the qualifications and standing of those who apply for the privilege of practicing before it.

Combining the announcement with an appeal to attorneys to be more circumspect in their appeal, the court laid down a stipulation under which those applying for admission to practice before the higher tribunal must file certificates of qualification.

French Expect Attack.

FEZ, French Morocco, June 10.—(A. P.)—Further fighting between the French and Rifian invaders is anticipated on the Bibane heights, where the tribesmen are extremely numerous, the district affording them excellent cover. The French have sent reinforcements and heavy artillery to that sector.

BRUSSELS, June 10.—(A. P.)—The Belgian Pilot DeMuyter, in the balloon Belgica landed at imper, Belgium a distance of about 122 miles from Brussels, so far the longest distance made in the Gordon-Bennett cup race.
