

THINKS M'MILLAN HAS BEST CHANCE FINDING EXPLORER

COPENHAGEN, Denmark, June 10.—(A. P.)—The best chance of finding Captain Roald Amundsen and his companion polar fliers, is at Cape Columbia, West Greenland, where the American expedition under Donald MacMillan is going, in the opinion of J. Daugaard Jensen, governor of Greenland.

"I believe Amundsen is en route here, as he has not returned to Spitzbergen," said M. Jensen today. Some mishap has occurred, doubtless to the airplanes, or in trying to reach the pole he used so much petrol that he was unable to return to his starting place and therefore flew as far as possible toward Cape Columbia, which is nearer the pole than Spitzbergen.

Depots were laid out by Gottfried Hansen at Cape Columbia, Richard Sound and Fort Conger. They will probably be Amundsen's salvation. This is one more proof of his foresight.

"The depots were laid out with view to the Maud expedition when it intended going into the ice by the Nome Siberian islands and realized that he might be forced to return afoot. When the flying expedition started, these depots were taken into consideration."

Governor Jensen believed, however, that Spitzbergen is the only spot from which an active effort to rescue Amundsen is possible. At other places, as along the east coast of Greenland or at Cape Columbia, the relief expeditions must wait until it turns up.

Colonel Koch, chief of the Danish air force, does not believe the probability of finding the Amundsen party by airplane search is very great. He agrees with other authorities that such a search is like "looking for a needle in a haystack."

Favors Canadian Minister to U. S.

U. S. DIRIGIBLES WON'T BE SENT TO NORTH POLE

WASHINGTON, June 10.—(A. P.)—Secretary Wilbur has no intention of sending either of the dirigibles, Los Angeles and Shenandoah in search of the missing Amundsen polar expedition.

In announcing refusal of a request by the Norwegian Aero club that one of the airships be sent to the rescue, the secretary declared "we are not going to send any wild goose chase to the polar regions."

The navy department has not changed its opinion that such an expedition is not feasible and Mr. Wilbur pointed out yesterday, that if sent, it could not be ready to operate before the three airplanes with the MacMillan arctic expedition could make a search for Amundsen. Difficulties attending a dirigible flight to the pole, he believes, would be greater than those of heavier-than-air machines, with the airship more highly susceptible to weather conditions.

INDIAN HEIRESS IS MARRIED TO OKLAHOMA YOUTH

OMAHA, Neb. June 10.—No trace had been found early today either here or in Council Bluffs, Iowa, across the Missouri river of Earl E. Gordon, 27, and his 16-year-old Indian heiress bride, who until yesterday was Maude LeeMudd of Miami, Okla. It is believed they returned to Oklahoma.

Accompanied by Mrs. Susanne Bomberly, the girl's mother, and V. J. Wilson, a white man, Gordon, also white, and the girl, obtained a marriage license to which the mother's consent was affixed. The ceremony was performed by a Presbyterian minister and the party departed in an automobile. Remarks made to the minister led him to believe they started for Oklahoma.

Miss LeeMudd, according to word from Miami, is heiress to \$1,200,000 and is the ward of a probate attorney.

REJECTED SUITOR STABS WOMAN IN HIGHWAY RIDE

EUGENE, Ore., June 10.—Harry Brink of Springfield is at a local hospital with a slashed jugular vein, and Mrs. Flossie Hurd, also of Springfield, is at the same hospital with several wounds in her head and back as a result of an alleged stabbing affray on the Pacific highway between here and Springfield Saturday night. Both the injured are expected to recover, according to the hospital authorities.

John Sollopak, who police declare did the stabbing, is still at liberty. The trio were riding toward Eugene in a car, according to the police. Brink was driving, and Mrs. Hurd was in the front seat with him. Sollopak, who was in the rear seat of the car, suddenly leaned forward and slashed Brink across the throat, the police declare, and then stabbed Mrs. Hurd several times.

The car, left without a guide, dashed across the highway into the ditch. Mrs. Hurd and Brink were thrown to the roadway, where she called for help.

A passing car picked up the injured pair and brought them to the hospital here.

Jealousy over the woman, who is said to have spurned his love, is ascribed by the police as the motive for Sollopak's act.

Mrs. Hurd is a widow, her husband having committed suicide about a year ago. She is the mother of four children.

Sollopak is said to be about 25 years of age.

ARREST PRINCIPAL FOR SPANKING GIRL

EAST ST. LOUIS, Ill., June 10.—(A. P.)—G. C. Williams, principal of the Webster public school here, is at liberty under \$300 bond today as result of his arrest yesterday on charge of unlawfully whipping Gerold H. Gates, 8 year old pupil of the school, it was learned today.

According to Mrs. Fred H. Gates, mother of the boy, Gerold and his sister, Lorine, 6, and three other children were whipped with a stick one-half inch thick and two inches wide because they crossed an intersection which they had been told was unsafe. The Gates children, she said, had red welts across the hips and it was necessary to call in a physician to treat them.

AMERICANS OUT OF BALLOON RACE, BELGIAN LEADING

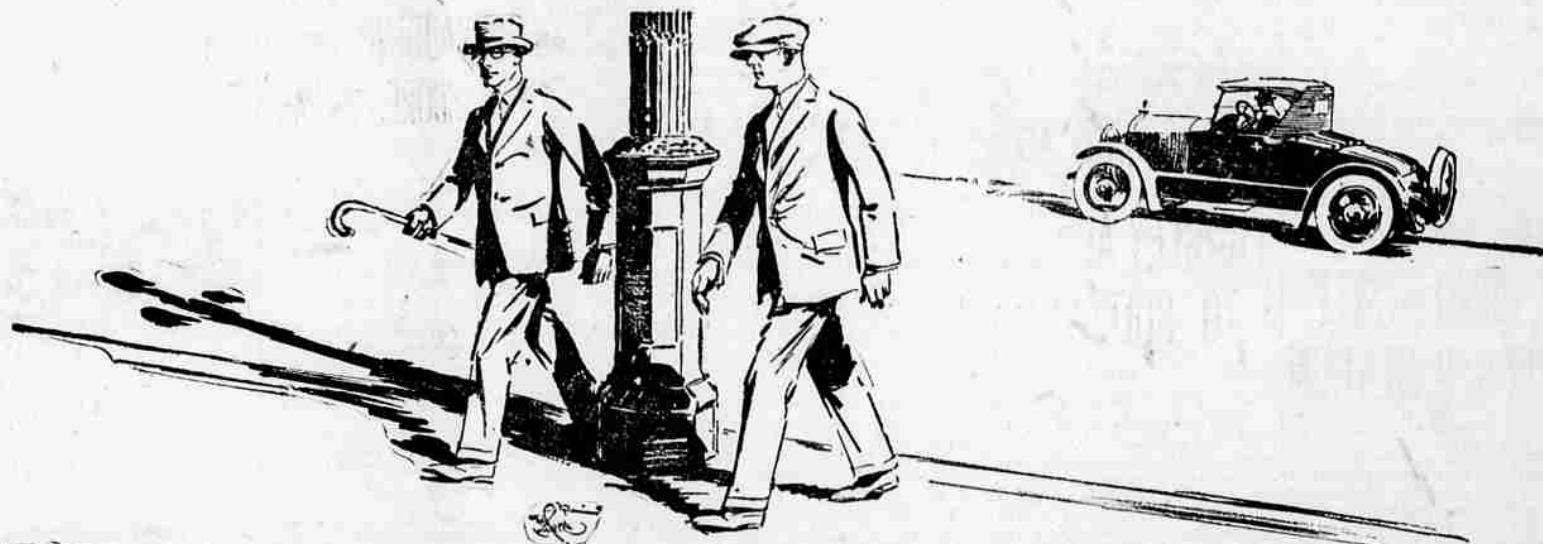
BRUSSELS, June 10.—(A. P.)—Both the American entrants are out of the balloon race for the Gordon-Bennett cup. The S-14, with Lieutenant Floyd and Lieutenant McCormick, landed near Dieppe, France, yesterday. The Goodyear III, piloted by Wade T. VanOrman, was today considered disqualified because its pilot accepted aid when the balloon fell at sea.

The three balloons which still were not heard from out of the eighteen that started Sunday were the Grand Charles, French, and the Belgica and Prince Leopold, Belgian. The Aero club at Brussels discredited rumors that Pilot DeMuyter, of the Belgica, had been killed landing in England. The French balloon Picardie landed at Anzeville, France, it was reported today.
