## FOUR BIG AUTO RACES AND MOTORCYCLE RACES TOMORROW AND SUNDAY

The price of admission, including war tax, is adults \$1; children 50c. Men in uniform of the National Guard 50c.

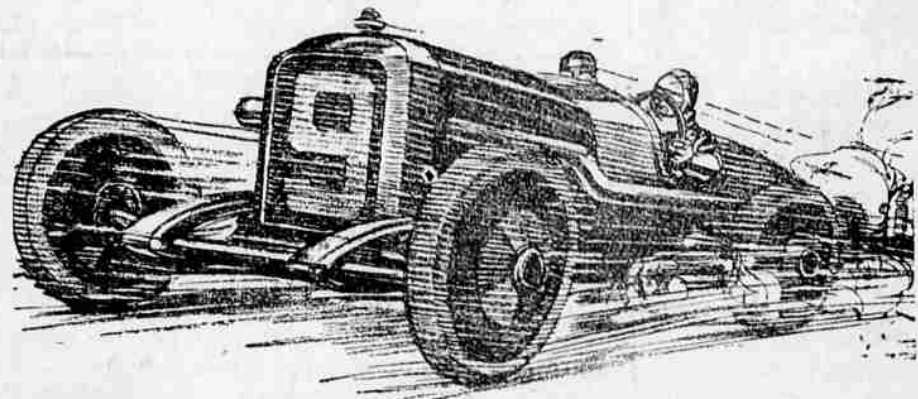

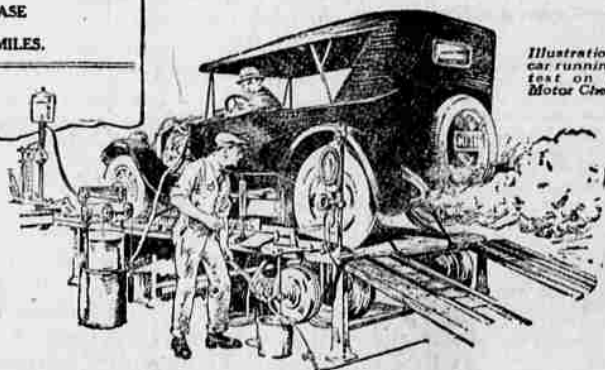


Illustration shows car running under test on Wasson Motor Check.
