Mr. and Mrs. A. T. Young of Prospect called on Mr. and Mrs. H. Watkins Monday afternoon.

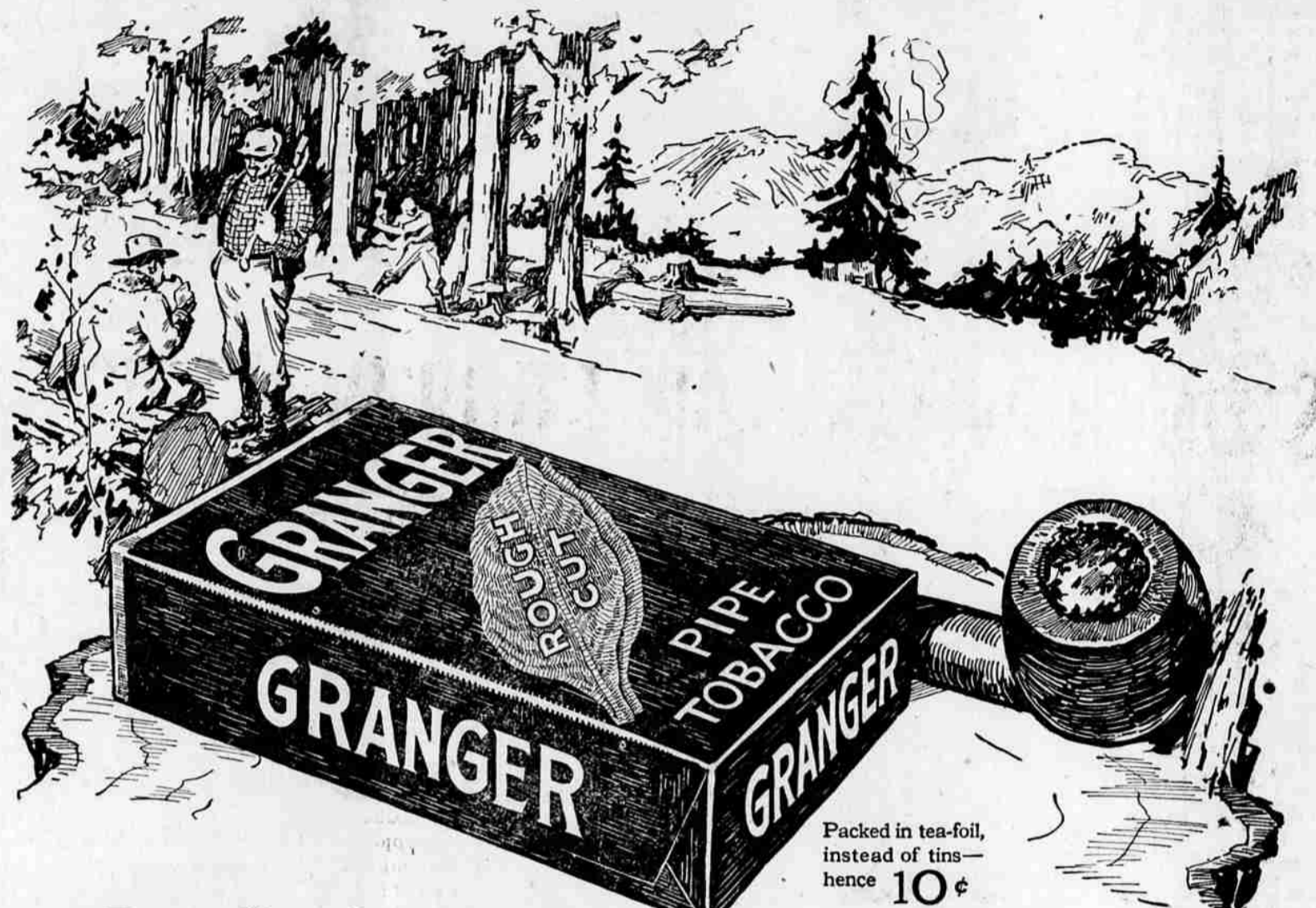
