

COPCO COMPANY GETS BIG BOOST IN OREGONIAN

(From the Sunday Oregonian, Portland, Oregon, May 31, 1925.)

Under the above head, the following item concerning the local power company was given prominent mention in the Sunday Oregonian of Portland, Oregon, heading the financial column of that paper.

When the California Oregon Power company sold more than \$1,000,000 of its preferred stock in 8 1/2 months almost entirely to its own customers and without aid of paid salesmen, it set up a record which may well be the envy of a lot of large utility and other corporations scattered over the nation.

Though officials of the company have not specifically said so, it is understood that the sales of more than 10,000 shares of the preferred stock were made entirely in the territory in southern Oregon and northern California served by the company. Three division headquarters are in Oregon, at Medford, Roseburg and Klamath Falls, and a fourth is at Yreka, California.

When an inquirer was told the facts regarding this unusual customer-ownership sale of stock by William H. Crawford, manager of the company's new industries department, the listener was inclined to "take the statement with a grain of salt." Mr. Crawford then set the facts down in writing as follows:

"Our entire No. 4 issue was disposed of at \$98.00 per share. The campaign lasted from July 15, 1924, to April 1, 1925. The entire issue of 10,000 shares was disposed of and there was an over-subscription the last day of 292 shares. In addition to this we sold 803 shares that had been reacquired, due to various causes. This sale brings our total number of stockholders up to 3117.

"Eighty per cent of our preferred stockholders are consumers. We have never employed a stock salesman and the entire issue has been disposed of by members of our regular organization for a very small commission. The ratio of cash sales to time sales shows that out of the 10,000 shares they divide almost exactly, 50-50."

"While stock salesmen were not used in the selling campaign of the California Oregon Power company, the issue was well advertised in newspapers of the district. This company has been making an excellent record for growth in every direction and for consistent gains in gross revenues and net earnings. Every item of its annual statement has steadily increased since 1918. In 1924 gross revenues were \$1,099,764 and net revenues before depreciation, interest and taxes, amounted to \$1,000,875.

U. OF W. EXAMINATION QUESTIONS STOLEN AND SOLD TO STUDENTS FOR \$10 PER

MADISON, Wis., June 12.—(A. P.) University of Wisconsin officials continued their investigation today of what is said to be the most flagrant case of theft and sale of examination questions ever uncovered at the state school.

Although first reports said the theft had been wholesale, it was believed after the investigation had been under way yesterday that only examination questions in the romance language and Spanish departments were involved.

Members of the faculty of the romance language department were reported to have been in session until

after midnight Wednesday comparing class grades with examination grades following the complaint of a student who gave the faculty the first clue.

It is also reported that at least three of the university buildings were broken into and professors' desks rifled to get copies of examination questions. Students have reported that they were approached by persons who offered to sell mimeographed copies of questions for \$5 to \$10 a set.

If it is impossible to deal with individual cases it may be found necessary to repeat examinations in all courses where there is suspicion that the questions were stolen and sold, it was hinted.

JUDGE KELLY WINS MASONIC HONORS

PORTLAND, Ore., June 12.—Officers of the Oregon grand lodge of Masons were installed today at the closing session of the twenty-fifth annual communication. The officers elected late yesterday are: Judge Percy R. Kelly was elected grand master, succeeding Judge Oliver P. Coshaw. All other officers were advanced as follows: Edgar H. Sosenich, Portland, deputy grand master; Robert S. Eakin, La Grande, senior grand warden; Rex W. Davis, junior grand warden; John B. Cleland, Portland, elected grand treasurer; Rufus Cheney, Forest Grove, grand secretary.

INCH AND A QUARTER JIMMY SENTENCED

PORTLAND, Ore., June 12.—Alex Gerlach, known to the police as "Inch and a Quarter Jimmy," was sentenced by Judge Morrow this afternoon to serve ten years in state prison following a change of plea from not guilty to guilty.

His attorney, A. F. Knight, asked for parole, but Judge Morrow hastily rejected it with this statement: "If this man is entitled to a parole, then there is no use in arresting any criminal or maintaining any prisons." "Inch and a Quarter Jimmy" was charged with robbing 1500 east side homes last winter and was shot when he was captured.

Boy Scout summer camp this year will be located at Lake of the Woods, and be open from July 6th until August 15th, application blanks have already been issued to Scouts through their scoutmasters and it is expected that a large number of boys from all over southern Oregon will attend.

One of the most interesting tales that Capt. O. C. Applegate of Klamath Falls, has to tell, is how Lake of the Woods received its name.

It was in the year 1870, when Captain Applegate and four or five scouts were attempting to find a way from Ashland to Pelican Bay, that would avoid the round about and hard trail through the mountains. They followed what has turned out to be the Dead Indian road, and had camped for the night in a thick stand of timber, knowing from the nature of the timber that they were near a body of water. Early next morning as the gray dawn spread itself over the country and birds gave further evidence that the water was near, Captain Applegate made his way through the thick lodge pole pines and came upon the lake which he estimated was about four miles long and two miles wide in places, all around was a thick stand of timber, well guarded by the tall mountains, so he called it the Lake of the Woods.

Some time later a cabin was built near the south end of the lake, the location of which the Boy Scouts will try to find this summer, and if successful, will mark the location as the first occupied by Captain Applegate in the early seventies.

Mr. Pitt is so near that the summit may be reached by a two day trip from the camp and about ten other hikes all of great interest have been mapped out, these with other attractive camp activities will give a real opportunity to do some unusual scouting.

The Court of Honor, which will be held June 24th, will be the last session in town before camp opens. Scouts are preparing now to make this a big event, as there is no school the finding of time for preparation is easy.

Troop 2, J. B. Coan, scoutmaster, has turned in two very fine bird houses and have won the bird house contest.

The Stop Forest Fire association will offer scouts an opportunity to win distinction the latter part of June, by allowing them to compete in securing members for their organization, details are being worked out and will be announced later.

All scouts who were in the Memorial Day parade will be interested to know that the photograph that was taken at the park was very fine and prints may be seen at headquarters.
