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## GENERAL WHITE CHIEF SPEAKER AT ELKS' FLAG DAY

The leading feature of the annual Flag day observance of the Medford lodge of Elks, held in the city park Sunday afternoon beneath the trees, was the address by Brigadier General George A. White, commanding officer of the Oregon National Guard before a large assemblage of citizens, many soldiers from Camp Jackson, and a large delegation of Elks, Patriotic and other selections were played by the 182nd regiment band from Camp Jackson and the D. O. K. K. band of this city.

General White's eloquent address pertained to a history of the U. S. flag from its birth. In the absence of Floyd Hart, exalted ruler of the Elks lodge, Carl Y. Tengwall, esteemed leading knight, presided at the exercises.

The Elks lodge ritualistic exercises on such occasions were observed, and a history of the flag was given by Don Newbury. The exercises concluded with the singing of America by the entire assemblage.

The always beautiful decorative feature on Elks flag day, furnished and made by N. C. Bennett, was on hand as usual, a handsome large liberty bell of flowers.

## RINGS ABOUT SUN TODAY EXPLAINED BY WEATHER MAN

The two big halos seen around the sun today until shortly after noon had the people of the city and valley quietly excited and caused many comments. The superstitions predicted everything dreadful, including the world possibly coming to an end or an earthquake or big storm.

The explanation of the halos, however, as given out by the local weather office, is that they were caused by the gathering of much moisture in the clouds, upon which the sun shone with rainbow effect and possibly might preclude a coming change in atmospheric conditions.

The general explanation as to the meaning, especially by those residents who formerly lived in the east, was that the halos meant a coming storm. What seemingly threw everyone "up in the air" was that the halos were so large, and with such a wide space between them. It is seldom that even one small halo is seen in the daytime and a rare occurrence for two of them to be seen at the same time.

The weather prediction, however, is for fair weather and a moderate temperature tomorrow.

## SCORES OF SPEED VIOLATORS FINED IN BIG ROUNDUP

For the past two days the traffic officers on duty in Jackson county have waged a veritable war on all violators of the traffic laws. Eight such cases came up before Judge Taylor in his court today and two last Saturday.

David Branigan of Woodburn pleaded guilty to the charge of speeding his automobile at the rate of 45 miles an hour and was fined \$15. Edward P. Sullivan of Dunsmuir was fined \$15 for reckless driving. E. R. Jones of Ashland pleaded guilty to the charge of operating a motor vehicle without lights and was penalized \$15. State Traffic Officer J. J. McMahon signed all the above complaints, save for the first one mentioned, which was signed by Traffic Officer A. H. Shorts.

W. H. Taylor was charged by C. C. Williams, state traffic officer, with operating a motor vehicle without an operator's license and was fined \$10. William Wheeler was charged with the same offense by the same officer and was fined the same amount. Boyd McKlum pleaded guilty to the charge of driving an automobile without proper headlights and was fined \$10. Willard Whitman was fined \$20 for a charge of speeding brought against him by State Officer W. J. Hatfield.

Berry Brotherton, an Oregon national guardsman, pleaded guilty to two charges, one of speeding and the other of operating an automobile without an operator's license. He promptly applied for the license, the penalty being suspended for the first charge, and for the second charge he was fined \$10.

Last Saturday J. J. Emmens appeared in Judge Taylor's court to answer a charge of speeding preferred against him by Traffic Officers Chas. Tolson and J. J. McMahon. He pleaded guilty and was fined \$15. B. Hardman, a motorcyclist, pleaded guilty to the charge of speeding his machine on the city streets, preferred against him by McMahon. He was fined \$20 and had his driver's license suspended for 30 days.
