SOUTH AMERICAN MAY BE CHAMPION OF UNITED STATES

NEW YORK, June 16.—(A. P.)—Benny Leonard's discarded lightweight boxing title lies between a hard hitting South American and a rugged former newsboy from Buffalo, N. Y.

Stanislav Loyza knocked out Cirilin Olano of Cuba, and Jimmy Goodrich got the decision over Benny Valger of New York at the Queensboro stadium last night in the semi-finals of a tournament to determine Leonard's successor.

Loyza, a Chilean, battered away with his left hand until Olano tumbled three times in the third round, taking the count on his last fall. Goodrich's terrific left cut through Valger's defense time after time. Goodrich and Loyza will meet for the title in the Queensboro ring on July 5, and the winner will be recognized by the New York state athletic commission as lightweight champion of the world.

U. S. GIRL CHAMP TO ATTEMPT SWIM ENGLISH CHANNEL

NEW YORK, June 16.—(A. P.)—Fortified with two new records, Miss Gertrude Ederle, 17 year old wonder mermaid of the Women's Swimming association, will sail tomorrow for England, where she will attempt to swim the English channel next month.

Miss Ederle yesterday shattered the men's record made by the late George R. Meehan of Boston in winning a marathon contest in 1914 for the 21 mile route from the Battery to Sandy Hook in New York bay. Her time for the distance was seven hours, eleven minutes, thirty seconds.

Endurance and speed stand out in the feat which is the greatest accomplished by a girl swimmer. The distance was never before negotiated by a woman.

Miss Ederle broke the world's record for 150 yards free style Sunday.

ATHLETICS WIN GAME, GREAT UPHILL FIGHT AND HOLD THE LEAD

NEW YORK, June 16.—Connie Mack's Athletics have increased their lead in the American league race by one of the greatest uphill battles ever staged in the majors.

Eleven runs behind yesterday, they scored thirteen runs and defeated Cleveland 17 to 15. Simmons' homer with two on base in the eighth polished off the battling attack in the eighth and accounted for the winning runs. Six pitchers were used by the Mackmen and three by their opponents.

As Washington was idle yesterday without a scheduled game, Philadelphia became a game ahead of its nearest competitor.

Ray Casey Wins in England EASTBURN, England, June 16.—(A. P.)—Ray Casey of San Francisco today defeated J. B. Wheatley, 7-0, 6-1, 6-3, in the first of the international tennis matches being played here between British and American teams.

SEAPLANES LOOK FOR AMUNDSEN WITHOUT AVAIL

ADVENT BAY, Spitzbergen, June 16.—(A. P.)—The two seaplanes of the Norwegian government's expedition to search for the Amundsen-Ellsworth north pole expedition, have made trial flights here. The expedition arrived Saturday on the steamship Ingette.

A veteran explorer, Ole Olson, navigated the Ingette through the floes of the ice fjord into the clear waters of Advent Bay, where one of Amundsen's auxiliary ships, the Farm, was anchored.

It was thought the relief expedition would continue quickly on its way, but changes in the arrangements intervened. It was several hours before the Ingette moored to a little wooden jetty and began unloading the planes and spare parts.

Meanwhile most of the population of Long Year City, which is the name of the local settlement, managed to scramble aboard and gazed, vastly impressed, at the seaplanes.

Long Year City belongs to a large Norwegian coal company. It is a straggling mining village of wooden houses. There is constant daylight here now, 24 hours around the clock. It was midnight before the planes were ready for a trial flight.

Lutzow Holm piloted one plane and Harold Styhr took charge of the other. They soared in the brilliant midnight sunshine, the Norwegian colors, a blue and white cross on a red field, painted on the planes, glistering in the light. This spectacle gave delight to the patriotic Norwegians who form a majority of the local population.

The machines behave dextrously during about two hours of trial flights. It was two o'clock in the morning when they descended, but the sun was shining and the fascinated crowd watching them from the shore had no thought of bed time.

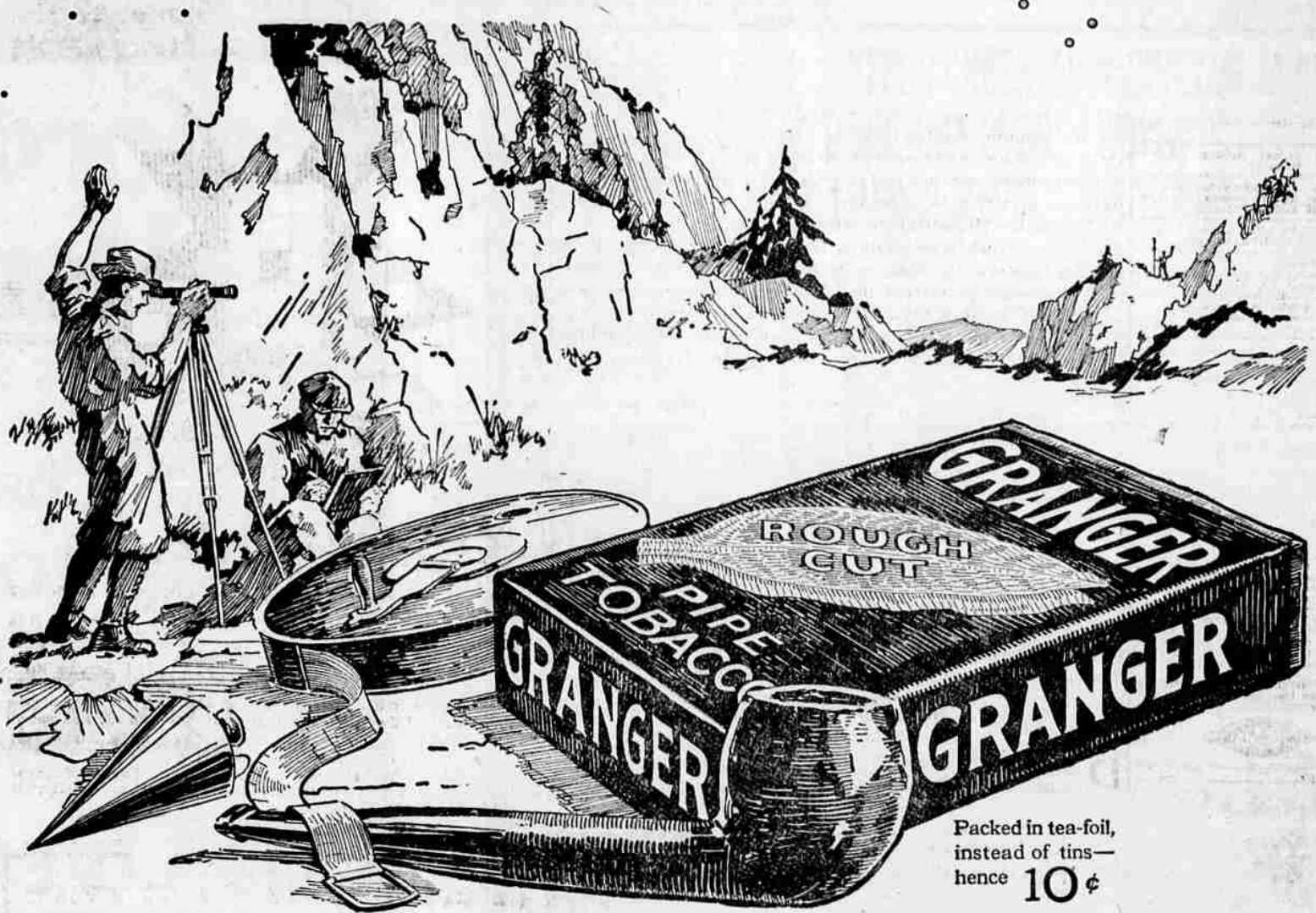
