

### REVIVAL MEETING OPENS TOMORROW ON HAYMARKET SQ.

Griffith Jones, lawyer and speaker, is to arrive in Medford tomorrow morning to engage in a three weeks' revival meeting. Jones is said to be a forceful speaker and will present the old-time religion. All of the Christian churches of Medford will co-operate in the revival which is to be started in a big tent to be erected opposite The Mail Tribune office. The first meeting is to be held Thursday evening at 7:30 o'clock.

Rev. J. B. Conn, president of the Medford Ministerial association and pastor of the South Methodist church, is to open the meetings. Rev. J. Willard DeYoe, of the First Methodist church; Rev. E. P. Lawrence, of the Presbyterian church; D. J. Howe, Christian church; W. J. Johnston, Baptist church; E. J. Johnson, Lutheran church; C. M. King, church of the Nazarene and Capt. Pitt of the Salvation Army are to have a part in the revival meetings.

The church people of Medford have been asked to help spread the news of the revival services throughout the Rogue River valley. The meetings are to be conducted so as not to conflict with any of the regular services here. The fact that the Oregon National Guard encampment is here induced Attorney Jones to begin his vacation meetings in Medford.

Bert Smith, for twelve years reporter on the Los Angeles Times, who was chosen by Gen. Harrison Gray Otis to route the ocean to ocean highway from the Pacific to the Atlantic, will be in charge of the meetings and will conduct the singing.

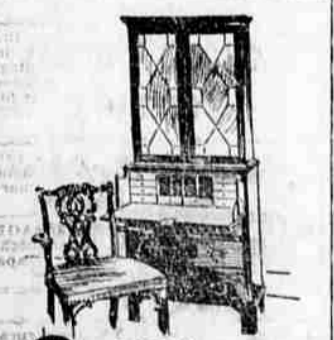
These men come to Medford recommended by Dr. W. A. Buchanan, president of the Ministerial association of Los Angeles and southern California and Rev. Dan Trundle, secretary, and such well known California ministers as Dr. Elmer E. Helms of the First Methodist church; Dr. James A. Frances of the First Baptist church; Dr. Hugh K. Walker, First Presbyterian church; Rev. Harry W. White, district superintendent of the Methodist conference; Edgar Vay Daugherty, First Christian church and a number of other prominent divines of Los Angeles, who have known both men for many years.

There is to be nothing sensational or flamboyant about the revival meetings, it is said. Only the gospel will be preached. "I have determined to know nothing save Jesus Christ and Him crucified" is one of the favorite Bible texts from which Attorney Jones will speak. The serious topic for the opening meeting, Thursday night, will be "Jesus Christ's Key to Success."

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., June 16.—W. P. Myers, who quit office last Saturday as acting district attorney, following a prolonged newspaper criticism of his office, last yesterday brought suit for libel against the Klamath Falls Evening Herald, seeking \$10,000 damages for alleged defamation of character. The ex-prosecutor announced at the same time that six similar suits would be filed against the newspaper.

### JACKSON COUNTY BOYS AND GIRLS REACH CORVALLIS

About 85 boys and girls from Klamath and Josephine counties were taken by special train Sunday to Corvallis where they will attend a two weeks' summer school given by the Oregon Agricultural college especially for their benefit. This train left Medford at 10:40 a. m. and arrived in Corvallis that evening at six. The train had the right of way from the city to its destination, the Shasta Limited even being sidetracked to let the special by.

Twenty boys and girls from Klamath county enjoyed their first railroad ride yesterday when they were taken to the college town. At Roseburg these young people were given a ride on the engine, and to mark the occasion motion pictures were taken of the event.

A. S. Rosenbaum, district freight and passenger agent, accompanied the train to its destination, and most of the way the young folks were eating ice cream, for that official had placed aboard a large freezer, especially for their benefit.

Robert Fowler, county agent, is in charge of the Southern Oregon delegation while they are in Corvallis. The school they are attending will include short courses in stock judging on the college experiment farm for the boys and courses in domestic science for the girls. They will be extensively entertained while they are there, with swimming parties, theater parties and picnics.

**SCOUTING**  
Wednesday morning at 8 o'clock scouts will meet at headquarters to leave in a body for the Elks' Picnic grounds, about twelve miles north of the city, on the Rogue River. The location has been selected by the Elks of this city as an ideal camp ground and a part of it is to be used for over-night camps by the boy scouts.

On this trip, which will be for two days and a night, the scouts will start some of the necessary work to make the site more attractive. One of the largest projects contemplated will be the construction of a fine swimming hole, water will be diverted from the river into a basin and held there or changed at will, shelters will be built around a big council fireplace and camp kitchens in which the scouts will test their skill as cooks and bakers will be the big features.

Summer camp, which will be held at Lake of the Woods this summer is attracting a lot of attention, camp applications are the subject of the day among the local scouts. The first two periods are the most popular so far. The construction crew will leave June 27th or 29th and a week later the first group of campers will arrive in camp, finding all the equipment in place.

Friday night there will be a general assembly of all scouts, this will be an out-door meeting which means something out of the ordinary for members of all troops in the city. Scoutmasters will be advised of the location.
