VON ELM MAKING MARVELOUS SCORE WITH NEW PUTTER

CHICAGO, June 18.—(A. P.)—George Von Elm, Los Angeles amateur golfer who a few years ago, as a resident of Salt Lake City, won the trans-Mississippi championship, is becoming an ambidextrous player, according to advices from the Pacific coast.

Von Elm plans to enter the national amateur at the Oakland country club, Pittsburg, in September. It is said he can golf almost as well from the port side as from his regular right handed position. In addition to this feat, he has been sinking putts lately for scores well below the seventy mark on various California links, using a new brass putter designed after his own ideas in conformity with United States Golf association standards. Whether or not his putter is responsible for his proficiency on the green is a question not yet cleared up.

NEW YORK, June 18.—(A. P.)—Mid-June, when major league pitchers are supposed to be warmed up to their summer tasks, finds record-breaking scoreless appearances daily. On Tuesday American and National league players bunched out 174 hits, including ten home runs. Yesterday they added 148 blows to the total, eight homers being registered.

(Continued From Page One) ing which some jurors argued for a first degree murder conviction, the defendant fainted. She was led from the court house sobbing for her mother. The jury refused to recommend mercy.

Sentence will be imposed Monday. The maximum penalty for first degree manslaughter, of which she was convicted, is imprisonment from ten to twenty years. The minimum is within the jurisdiction of the court.

"A sentence like this may stop women shooting men in the future," said Judge McIntyre in praising the jury. "Too many times have women appeared in these courts on murder charges and appealed to men's natural natures. In many cases they have escaped punishment."

In her testimony the girl denied firing the pistol. She said it was fired accidentally when she was trying to take it away from her father, who, she said, had threatened to shoot Connors. She said she loved Templeton, but admitted intimate relations with Connors.

"She's too glib, she's the smart young woman of today," said the prosecutor, in arguing to the jury.

ROAD IS CLEARED TO WITHIN MILE OF GOVT. CAMP

The preparation work at Crater National park is going rapidly forward for the visit of the big caravan bearing the Oregon National Guard to the park next Saturday, stated Superintendent C. G. Thomson on his return to the city from the park last night with Brigadier General George A. White and staff who spent yesterday there inspecting sites at which the guardsmen will bivouac Saturday night.

The large gang of workmen clearing the road of the deep packed snow between the Medford entrance and government camp were last evening within a mile of government camp. Although Superintendent Thomson did not so state it is about a fifty-fifty proposition that government camp will be reached by the snow removing gang by Saturday forenoon.

A complete telephone service was established last night between Medford and the lodge, also with various phone stations all along the route between Prospect and Anna Spring camp, so that the long soldier auto caravan will be kept in touch with its various parts and also the outside world, during the trip. Superintendent Thomson leaves early this evening on a return trip to the park.

It has not yet been definitely announced as to just where the auto caravan will camp Saturday night on the return trip from the lake, but it will either be at Silver camp or Union creek.

The national guardsmen in addition to the novelty of visiting Crater National park, still in its winter mantle of snow, and marching probably a mile or more from government camp over the deep snow to the rim of the lake at the lodge, may also enjoy a spectacle of wild life, as the bears are already out in the park, more numerous and earlier than usual at this time of year, and numerous deer are also seen in the park.

In fact one large buck on the return trip of the military party from the lake last evening nearly ran into the auto near Anna Spring camp.
