LINCOLN, Neb., June 19.—(A. P.) Criminal prosecution as well as civil suits to collect over-payments alleged to have been made road contractors during the republican administration of Governor Samuel McKelvie, under George Johnson, former commissioner of public works, will be started shortly in the state courts, Attorney General Spillman announced today.

A letter delivered to Spillman today from Johnson asks that the suits begin immediately. Johnson said he was anxious to have these matters cleared up in order that he might then institute proceedings against former Governor Charles W. Bryan, whom he charges with "violation of the state corrupt practices act; violation of the state budget law and forcing a deficit so as to embarrass the previous state administration; violation of section 8350 of the compiled state statutes of 1922 by fraudulent use of the state revolving fund; for fraudulent use of funds received from the federal government and for fraudulent use of the federal mails in connection with his private coal company.

SALEM, Ore., June 19.—Offering a bid of \$18,015, the Cherry City Construction company of Salem won the contract award from the state board of control Wednesday for construction of a new pavilion at the state tuberculosis hospital.

Money for the building was appropriated by the 1925 legislature.

ACTION STARTED AGAINST BRYAN FOR PIERCE MOVE

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CONTRACT LET FOR NEW TUBERCULAR PAVILION

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CHAIR TRUST PLEADS GUILTY, FINED \$166,000

CHICAGO, June 19.—(A. P.)—Defendants indicted in the recent furniture case under the Sherman anti-trust law, pleaded guilty today and were fined a total of \$166,000 by Federal Judge Adam C. Chffe.

The defendants who pleaded guilty were all chair concerns and were, in respect to the fines imposed, which ranged from \$1000 to \$5000, divided into five classes, according to the size of the concern. The defendants fined were companies located in Illinois, Ohio, Wisconsin, Pennsylvania, Michigan, West Virginia, New York, Indiana and Massachusetts.
