## LEGAL DECISION ON NEW TAX LAW REDUCES REVENUE

SALEM, Ore., June 19.—Receipts of the public service commission from the gross earnings statistics on public utilities and railroads imposed by an act of the 1925 legislature, and estimated to produce \$80,000 for a biennium, will be reduced and estimated one-half, or to about \$40,000 for a biennium, by an interpretation of the law made by an attorney General Van Winkle today in reply to a query by the commission.

The opinion holds that the tax applies only to purely intra-state business and that any income of the utilities from inter-state business done on Oregon account cannot be taxed. To tax it would be contrary to the federal constitution, he holds. The commission has already collected under the act \$26,051. It happens that only a small part of this will have to be refunded under the opinion of the attorney general.
