

### RE-TELL STORY OF ASSAULT ON GIRL TO TRIAL JUDGE

NOBLESVILLE, Ind., June 19.—(A. P.)—Miss Madge Oberholtzer's version of an alleged attack made on her by D. C. Stephenson, aided by Earl Klinek and Earl Gentry, has been given to Judge Frederick Hines of the Hamilton circuit court for consideration in determining whether the three men shall be admitted to bail pending their trial on a charge of murdering her. Dr. John K. Kingsbury of Indianapolis, Miss Oberholtzer's physician and Marshall Oberholtzer, her brother, both related to Judge Hines yesterday the story she told them of mistreatment by Stephenson.

Marshall Oberholtzer repeated his sister's story of taking poison in a hotel at Hammond, Ind., following the alleged attack by Stephenson and also told the young woman's version of Stephenson's actions when he discovered she had sought to end her life.

"What was said about a hospital?" asked Eph Inman, chief of defense counsel.

"I do not remember," replied Oberholtzer. "She said Stephenson said she must go to Crown Point (county seat of Lake county, in which Hammond is located) and get married. He stuck a revolver to her heart when he said it."

"What did she say then?" Inman queried.

"She said 'what would I want to marry you for?' and she said Stephenson replied: 'You can use my name.'"

Dr. Kingsbury, who had preceded the brother as a witness, testified that Miss Oberholtzer was in possession of her mental faculties when the alleged dying statement was made.

Practically the same story of the attack as was given when he testified at a coroner's inquest in Indianapolis, following the young woman's death.

Bethrice Sprattley, nurse who attended Miss Oberholtzer, testified today there were several lacerations on the young woman's body.

REGATTA COURSE, NEW LONDON, Conn., June 19.—(A. P.)—Yale eight-oared crews swept the Thames river in the morning events of the annual crew classic with Harvard. The Blue freshmen led the Crimson home over a two-mile course by three lengths and the junior varsity of Yale finished four lengths in front. The freshmen time was: Yale 9:51 2-5, Harvard 10:01.

In the junior varsity race the time was: Yale 9:50, Harvard 10:02.

REGATTA COURSE, NEW LONDON, Conn., June 19.—(A. P.)—The historic Thames course was smooth and rowing conditions were perfect when the Yale and Harvard varsity eights left their quarters for the starting line of their four-mile race this afternoon. Hundreds of spectators lined the banks and observation trains on both sides of the river were ready to follow the crews. The race was postponed until 6:30 by the referee.

### ADMIRAL ROBISON IS TO LEAD FLEET

WASHINGTON, June 19.—(A. P.)—Admiral S. H. Robison, commander in chief of the battle fleet, has been selected to succeed Admiral Robert E. Coontz, as commander in chief of the United States fleet.

Rear Admiral C. E. Hughes, in command of the fleet training at the navy department, will succeed Admiral Robison as commander in chief of the battle fleet.

GLEN COVE, June 19.—(A. P.)—Mrs. J. P. Morgan, wife of the financier, is seriously ill of sleeping sickness at her summer home at Metinck Point on East Island, her physician announced today. Her condition was reported slightly improved.

Mrs. Morgan was stricken while attending church services last Sunday. Mr. Morgan, who was cruising in Long Island sound on his yacht, the Corsair, was announced by wireless and reached her bedside some hours afterward. He, with his two daughters, have been constantly at the bedside. Several doctors are in attendance.

### L. A. DENTIST NOW DENIES CONFESS'N, INSANE PLEA NEXT

LOS ANGELES, June 19.—(A. P.)—While the body of Mrs. Grace Grogan Young was being buried here yesterday, her dentist husband, Thomas W. Young, who has made several statements that he killed her with gas February 21 last, was alternately issuing a repudiation of his confessions and denying that he knew "anything of any murder."

This reversal of conduct was followed almost immediately by announcement of defense attorneys indicating that they intended to bring forward an insanity plea for their client.

John Gray, foreman of the Grogan ranch, formerly owned by Mrs. Young's first husband, Patrick Grogan, olive millionaire, with his wife, disappeared February 21 and last Saturday night, when her body was found.

### DEATH OF AGED HERMIT LEADS TO DISCOVERY SISTER

NEW-YORK, June 19.—(A. P.)—Discovery of the death of William P. Gallagher, 71 year old odd-job man of Astoria, Queens, has revealed also that his aged sister, Mary, had lived in the old man's squalid hut for three years without neighbors being aware of her existence. When acquaintances went to the hut yesterday to find out why Gallagher had not been seen in his accustomed haunts for three days, they were met at the door by a little white-haired woman, clothed only in a ragged potato sack. She pointed to the body of her brother on a rude couch and explained that she had not reported the death, because Gallagher "never let her go out of doors."

Balloon Prize Awarded  
BRUSSELS, June 19.—The Aero club today declared the Belgian, M. Aemstra, winner of the Gordon Bennett cup balloon race and DeMuyter, Belgian, second. The American, Wade T. Van Orman, was disqualified.

### RAILWAY TRAINMEN AND CONDUCTORS TO ASK WAGE INCREASE

CLEVELAND, June 19.—(A. P.)—Chairmen's associations of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen and the Order of Railway Conductors will hold joint divisional meetings in November to consider the proposition of seeking a wage increase from approximately 200 railroads in the United States for trainmen and conductors, W. G. Lee, president of the trainmen, announced today.

The amount of the increase to be asked, was not announced, but Mr. Lee said the wage reduction to railroad men in 1921 amounted to about 12 per cent, approximately 64 cents a day, that an increase last year amounted to approximately five per cent and that the request for an increase would probably at least be enough to make up the 1921 reduction.

NEW YORK, June 18.—The toll of the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western railroad's wreck at Rockport sag, New Jersey, Tuesday, was up to 44 today and twelve other persons are in a critical condition at various hospitals.

The bodies will be shipped today to Chicago, where a majority of the victims lived.

### W. C. T. U. MEETS IN SHADOW OF SCOT LIQUOR DISTRICT

EDINBURGH, Scotland, June 19.—(A. P.)—Nearly 2000 women from fifty-one countries are gathered here for the twelfth triennial convention of the World's Women's Christian Temperance union, which opened this morning with a session of the executive committee.

The tall chimney stacks of Edinburgh's breweries and distilleries rise everywhere to remind the temperance workers from all parts of the world that they are in the heart of the enemy's country. Two hundred American delegates arrived yesterday. "May we be united in spirit against spirits," said Lady Astor, member of the house of commons, in greeting the convention.

BRUSSELS, June 19.—The bones of Peter the Hermit, one of the leading preachers of the first crusade, are reported to have been found at Huy, while the ground covering the ancient closter was being leveled. Peter the Hermit, also called Peter of Amiens, who was born about 1050, died at Huy, Belgium, on July 11, 1115. He had the advance of the first crusade as far as Asia-Minor in 1096.

### ONE BATH A WEEK IS UNCONSTITUTIONAL

BERKELEY, Calif., June 19.—(A. P.)—B. C. Conologue drew the water for his bath today and his landlord called the police. It appears that the landlord, Gus Paulson, had informed Conologue that he would have to forego the bath as he had already taken one "tub" this week and that was all that the rules of the house called for. The sound of running water was about the only reply the landlord got to his demands.

Then he called the police, but by that time Conologue had finished his bath and had started on his daily dose. The police informed the landlord that there was no ordinance against personal cleanliness and handed down a decision declaring the "one a week bath" rule of the house unconstitutional.
