Oregon's National Guardsmen today were confronted by the most important event from a standpoint of public as well as organization interest.

State officials present included Gov. Walter M. Pierce, Secretary of State Sam Koser, Attorney General Van Winkle, State Senator Ike Patterson, Among military officers of high rank was Major General Charles T. Menoher, U. S. army, Commanding Ninth Corps Area with headquarters in San Francisco.

With the forecast for continued fair, hot weather, the Oregon guardsmen early today anticipated no relief from the excessively high temperatures which have prevailed during the last four days.

LIVERPOOL, June 22.—(A. P.)—Grettit Alkarsson of Victoria, B. C., explorer, who has been planning an effort to reach the north pole in a small dirigible, sailed from the Mersey field this afternoon in what he said was an attempt to reach "farthest north."

PREFERS DEATH TO EXECUTION HELP REFUSED

Bernard Grant Refuses to Submit to Operation in Effort to Save Life—'Let Me Alone, I will Be Dead in a Little While.'

CHICAGO, June 22.—Bernard Grant, fearful of the hangman's noose in spite of the efforts of thousands of persons throughout the country who had signed petitions urging clemency of Governor Len Small, refused today to permit physicians to perform an operation in the hope of saving his life, and died thirty minutes later.

PREFER DEATH TO FORT SURRENDER

PARIS, June 22.—A dispatch to the Intransigent from Foz, French Morocco, says that Second Lieutenant Lapeyre with six Senegalese soldiers, the only survivors of his original garrison of 22 men, blew up his blockhouse on the Franco-Moroccan front on June 14 rather than be taken alive or surrender to the besieging Rifians of Abd-el-Krim's forces.

WOMAN COMMITS SUICIDE IN WATER HAZARD ON GOLF CLUB AT PORTLAND

PORTLAND, Ore., June 22.—Three Portland persons met death violently over Sunday, one in an automobile accident, another by drowning in Oswego lake, and the third in a suicide in a water hazard at East Moreland golf links.

The dead: Mrs. Kate Garlinghouse, 43, fatally injured in an accident between a street car and an automobile in which she was riding.

SIMPLE SERVICE MARKS FUNERAL OF LA FOLLETTE

Wishes of Late Senator Are Carried Out As Body Is Laid to Rest in Madison, Wisconsin - Tremendous Crowds Attend Obsequies.

MADISON, Wis., June 22.—Services of extreme simplicity attended the burial today of Senator Robert Marion LaFollette.

Although from the moment his funeral train arrived here last Saturday from Washington, the state had claimed his body for its own, there was nothing of pomp or ceremony in these, the last honors that it might tender.

Propriet of New Democracy
MADISON, Wis., June 22.—(A. P.)—Robert M. LaFollette was described as the "embattled prophet of a new democracy."

He was the voice of humanism in politics," Dr. Hayden said. "Confronted with the tragedies of a soulless, material civilization, Robert LaFollette dedicated himself to the principle that government is the guardian and servant of the life of all the people.

He was forced to challenge special privilege in every form and sphere. He became the champion of the weak against the arrogance of wealth and power. Fearless, incorruptible, his head above the murk and miasma of selfishness and greed, his feet firmly planted in the thickness of fact, he gave his life to making the government the servant of human values in a new and difficult age."

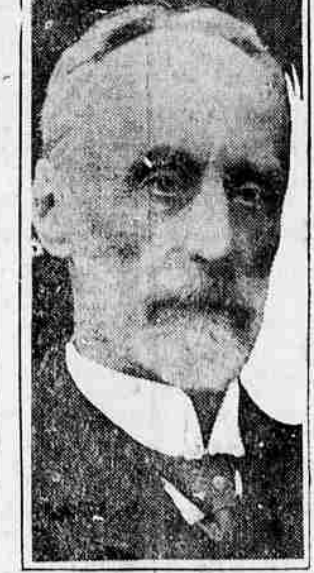
MELTING POT FOR ALIENS CRITICISED

RECALLED MAYOR OF KELSO BACK AFTER MURDER OF FRIEND

KELSO, Wash., June 22.—Following assassination of Thomas Doversy, one of his followers, A. Ruric Todd returned to this city today and announced that he still considered himself mayor, an office from which he was recalled June 2.

The old-style scalloped revolver which was found near the body of Thomas Doversy after he was shot Friday night, was partially identified today by James L. Spooner, fireman at the Ames Ayres mill in Kelso. He had disposed of the weapon several months ago.

An autopsy on the body was ordered this afternoon by Coroner Van Note. Mr. and Mrs. J. T. Evans, friends of Mrs. Doversy, arrived at her home Sunday from Eugene and declared they intend to assist in every way possible to bring the murderer to justice.

SENATOR LADD NORTH DAKOTA DIES SUDDENLY

Aide of LaFollette and Leader in Farm Bloc Passes Away in Hospital at Baltimore On Day His Chief Is Buried—Wife at Bedside.

BALTIMORE, June 22.—Senator Edwin Freeman Ladd of North Dakota died here at 10:20 a. m. today. A complication of kidney trouble, which took an acute turn for the worse during the night caused death at a hospital. Those at his bedside had given up hope.

The senator was conscious and in full command of his faculties as late as last night. Senator Ladd passed away quietly, retaining consciousness almost to the last. Mrs. Ladd arrived from Washington an hour before the end came and was at the bedside with Milton, one of the sons, who is studying law at George Washington university, and his daughter, Virginia, who attends high school in Washington.

WASHINGTON, June 22.—(A. P.)—With the passing of Senator Ladd, the republican insurgent bloc in the senate suffers its second overwhelming loss within four days. By coincidence the death of the North Dakotan occurred on the day of the burial of Senator LaFollette, whose policies he had followed on many occasions.

DEATH TOLL OF THE AUTOMOBILE

SEATTLE, June 22.—Two deaths reported here today brought the week-end automobile fatalities to six. Mrs. Hazel Dalley, 31, Seattle, died from a moving machine driven by her husband, striking on her head and was killed.

BEND, Ore., June 22.—A number of forest fires caused by lightning have been reported to the local forestry office since Saturday. None of these are serious and most of them are in the Crescent district, according to forestry officials. One is in the Sisters district and one is in the Fort Rock district. The number was placed at ten by officials this morning.

Kentucky Convicts in Peeve, Forced Away From Dinner Tables

FRANKFORT, Ky., June 22.—(A. P.)—Guards at the state reformatory here were redoubled this afternoon after some difficulty was experienced in directing the 800 men prisoners to return to their work after lunch. The emergency whistle was sounded when the men refused to leave the dining room after their noonday meal. Guards rushed into the room. Not until Superintendent Bastin, hurriedly summoned from a downtown meeting appeared in the hall did the men consent to resume their work.

PIERCE REFUSES TO GRANT ELKS STATE HOLIDAY

SALEM, Ore., June 22.—Governor Pierce today decided, notwithstanding an appeal from Elks' organizations all over the state, not to proclaim a holiday on July 16, the date of the parade of the national Elks' convention in Portland. The governor sent a letter to Ben S. Fisher of Marshfield, president of the state Elks' association.

TRAPPED BY FIRE, FAMILIES SAVED

PORTLAND, Ore., June 22.—Trapped upstairs in a burning frame building, six persons escaped by a ladder hurriedly thrown up by some one who had seen the blaze, when a restaurant operated by Joseph LaSalle and J. D. Gilmore at 575 Sherlock avenue, burned early today.

ANOTHER CHICAGO OFFICER SLAIN

CHICAGO, June 22.—Two robbers fatally shot Policeman Patrick McGovern today after obtaining the receipts of Pantheon theater in a hold-up at the North Shore Trust and Savings bank and escaped. The policeman died in a hospital. McGovern was accompanying a theater messenger who was carrying an estimated \$5000 and the holdup occurred about a block from the bank.

DOROTHY PERKINS SENTENCED TO THE PENITENTIARY FROM 5 TO 15 YEARS

NEW YORK, June 22.—(A. P.)—From five to fifteen years imprisonment in Auburn prison was the sentence imposed today upon Dorothy Perkins, charged with killing Thomas Templeton, Jersey City war veteran and her suitor.

SHEPHERD TO TAKE STAND OWN BEHALF

Germ Murder Defense Attacks Veracity of State's Star Witness—Reputation "Very Bad"—Accused to Testify Late Today

CHICAGO, June 22.—(A. P.)—The climax of the trial of William D. Shepherd for murder—the appearance of the defendant on the witness stand—was in prospect today. With several defense witnesses still to be heard, it was indicated that Shepherd's turn would come late today or early Tuesday.

Possibility that the defendant would not take the stand was dissipated by a statement by defense counsel that they hoped to present him by Tuesday morning at the latest.

CHICAGO, June 22.—(A. P.)—The defense in the William D. Shepherd murder trial today further attacked the testimony and character of the state's star-witness, Charles C. Faiman.

Mabel McClanahan, one of the nurses who attended young McClintock in his final illness testified it was part of her duty to bathe the youth and that no marks were on his body. Later she said hypodermic injections which left marks, were made under orders of the doctor.

The nurse said she had seen Miss Pope and Mrs. Shepherd in prayer together and that Miss Pope had been in Mrs. Shepherd's arms and also had been sitting upon Mrs. Shepherd's lap as they sought to console each other over Billy's illness.

Attorney Stewart stated during a recess at 3:30 p. m., that Shepherd would not take the witness stand today. Dr. Herman Bundesen, city health commissioner, testified that after publication of Faiman's confession he conducted an investigation and everybody in the department denied that Faiman had obtained bacilli from the laboratory.

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
