OBITUARY

CAMERON—Dan Cameron, who passed away at the Sacred Heart Hospital on Sunday morning, had been actively engaged in placer mining on Pleasant creek since about 1894. He was particularly well known in the Rogue River section of the county, and in his quiet way had accumulated a good many friends, who will be grieved to know of his death. He was in his eighties, but until his recent sickness had never shown any of the marks of age. He was of Scotch-English descent. He was scrupulously honest, rarely, if ever, in trouble over business or personal matters; attended to his own affairs, and impressed his friends and business associates with his sincerity and integrity. The property which he operated is known as the Cameron Placers, and because of some difficulties in operation by the hydraulic process, has long been considered as an attractive property for dredging purposes. The later years of his life had been devoted to putting these and adjoining properties together for dredging equipment and mining upon a large scale.

He left no immediate family and such relatives as are known, reside in Scotland.

SUPERSTITION AND IGNORANCE BANE AMERICAN LIFE

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Cal., June 22.—Dr. Ray Lyman Wilbur, president of Stanford university, addressed the graduating class today, at the 34th annual commencement, on "blinders." He contended that superstitions, dogmas, folk lore and old wives' tales were blinders "put on us, or by others for us to keep us from seeing in all directions to force us to see only a part and a chosen part of our surroundings. He said:

"To put on such blinders is a favorite way the old save for bringing up the young. It is easier to beat a drum or squirt the blood of a black cat killed in the dark of a moon on a sick man than it is to use the microscope and the test tube in studying him with the purpose of changing the water supply of his neighbors to keep them from the same illness. It is easier to pull down the shades to new and disquieting light than to face it unafraid.

"Our eyes are directed backward more than forward in much of the process which we use to train men and women for the days ahead.

"Our records are crowded with much human experience, and we know a great deal about ourselves and the world. It seems queer that man's body is pretty much that of centuries ago. While we live longer, have fewer epidemics and less days of illness, no one would seriously claim that Nurni could run better than some of the marathon runners of Greece, or that John L. Sullivan or Jack Dempsey had finer bodies than Sampson or Goliath or some of the gladiators of Rome. There is no evidence that the quality of man's mind has improved in spite of centuries of training.

DEBS LAUDS RUSSIA, CONDEMNS COURTS IN UNITED STATES

MINNEAPOLIS, June 22.—(A. P.)—Eugene V. Debs, socialist leader, praised the soviet government of Russia and urged the reorganization of the present trades unions into industrial unions and criticized the courts in an address at a socialist conference here last night.

The speech concluded a two-day convention of Minnesota socialists.

"Join the union of your craft," Mr. Debs said. "The industrial unions are the forerunners of industrial democracy. You will never succeed in taking over the government until you are organized industrially and you will never vote in the co-operative commonwealth without an industrial organization."

Later in his address he referred to the achievements of the socialists in European countries when he praised the Russian revolution.

Referring to the courts he declared: "Most of you think the courts are courts of justice," he said, "but let me say that they are not—they are courts of injustice."

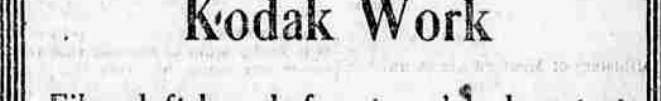
