

ORDERS ISSUED FOR DEPARTURE OF NAT'L GUARD

First Train to Leave Medford at 5 A. M. Friday—All But Three Companies to Be at Home Friday Night.

Program Tomorrow. Secretary of Agriculture Day. Hon. W. M. Jardine, of Washington, D. C., Secretary of Agriculture, and his official party will be present and inspect camp and be entertained at officers' mess at 12:30 p. m., by Brigadier General George A. White and staff.

Orders for the movement of the Oregon National Guard troops in camp here back to their homes at expiration of their two weeks of training and instruction, were in the hands of the various unit commanders, early today.

Five trains, each made up of one or more baggage cars and from 10 to 14 coaches, will be required to transport the soldiers. Following is the schedule in detail:

Train No. 1 leaves Medford at 5:00 a. m., under command of Maj. E. R. Huron. It will carry the following units: Headquarters and headquarters company, 1st battalion, 186th Infantry; companies F, G & H, 186th Infantry and headquarters company, 3rd battalion, 162nd Infantry. Arrival in Portland 6:00 p. m.

Train No. 2 leaves Medford at 5:30 a. m., under command of Capt. W. H. Ellenberg. Its baggage car goes thru to Tillamook. It will carry Companies A, K, L and M, 162nd Infantry and Company I, 186th Infantry. This train arrives in Eugene at 2:15 a. m. and will proceed north over the West Side tracks of the Southern Pacific.

Train No. 3 leaves at 6 a. m., under command of Lt. Col. F. M. West, with the following units aboard: Headquarters and headquarters company, 162nd Infantry; service company, band section, 162nd Infantry, Medical detachment and Companies B, E and G, 162nd Infantry, and headquarters company, 82nd Infantry brigade. Arrival in Portland at 7:15 p. m.

Train No. 4 leaves at 6:30 a. m., Maj. B. W. Van Horn commanding, and will carry the following units: Headquarters 186th Infantry, Service company, band section, 186th Infantry, Companies F and H, 162nd Infantry, Company B, 186th Infantry, Howitzer company, 162nd Infantry, Company A, 116th Engineers, Battery A, Field Artillery, G. H. C. reserve, state staff corps and departments. Arrives in Portland 7:45 p. m.

Train No. 5 leaves at 7 a. m., Col. Eugene Moshberger commanding. It will carry: Howitzer company, 186th Infantry; Medical detachment and companies C and D, 186th Infantry; headquarters and headquarters company, 1st battalion, Companies C, D, E, L, 162nd Infantry and Hospital company No. 167. Arriving in Albany this train will take the Lebanon-Silverton loop and will terminate at Woodburn.

Thursday probably will be the busiest day confronting the troops since their arrival in Camp Jackson. Not only will there be inspection, muster and payment of the soldiers, but it is certain that there will be military ceremonies attending the visit of W. M. Jardine, secretary of agriculture of the United States, including the salute of 15 guns which is accorded a cabinet officer.

Frenchman Killed

Detailed accounts of yesterday's shooting at Canton show that the anti-foreign domination was comparatively peaceful until one section of the parading Chinese began firing from the band toward Shamen. A French merchant was killed and a British marine and three civilians wounded, including the white commissioner of customs.

Pope's Aid Asked

The text of the appeal sent to Pope Pius by professors of the National University of Peking, given out in Rome last night, repeats the charges made in the Chinese vernacular press that the foreigners "have perpetrated murders against unarmed Chinese citizens in the international establishments at Shanghai, Hong Kong and elsewhere."
