

### PRE-COOLING OF FRUIT GREAT AID SAYS MANAGER

Medford Pre-cooling & Storage Co., urges all fruitgrowers to become interested in Medford's newest enterprise and gives many reasons for such action.

"There is under construction," said Mr. Hamlin today in Medford a modern cold storage and pre-cooling plant for the handling of all kinds of perishable products. This will be finished in ample time to handle this year's crop of pears. It is designed so as to give the very latest benefit in refrigeration construction. It is insulated throughout with Armstrong cork, the system used being known as the indirect. Under this system there are no pipes in the room, these being all located in a bunker room in the basement. The cold air is blown through the rooms by a large blower fan handling about 50,000 cubic feet of air per minute. There is said to be no danger to stored fruits as the refrigeration is cold brine.

"The large investment now being made through the northwest in the building of new cold storage houses would not be made unless the districts had, from previous experience, found that the place to hold the bulk of this fruit was at the point of production. The districts that have protected themselves with ample storage facilities are the ones that have shown a profit."

"What are some of the advantages in the storing on the production end? In selling a product like the Rogue River pear, quality is the thing that counts. The process of development or ripening is very fast and the sooner we can get this product into storage from the tree and cooled, the more days we add to its keeping quality. Goods started east cannot be moved west again unless extra freight is paid. Fruit held here is under the supervision of the owner, he can inspect it at any time and is familiar with its physical condition. It is held in modern houses built for that purpose. Fruit on this end can always move east, can be exported, sold in California, and a certain amount sold locally. A buyer of fruit is just as anxious to secure certain sizes, grades and varieties as a buyer of cloth. This can only be done at the shipping end, where cars can be filled as ordered; this sometimes is worth 50 cents a box more to the grower."

"We would request all those interested to call at our office and examine the numerous letters we have received from agricultural departments of different states, commission men, fruit auctioneers, and dealers as to the advisability and the difference in price received between fruit non pre-cooled and fruit that is pre-cooled."

### CHRISTIANS LUKE-WARM, FLAYED BY EVANGELIST JONES

Church members of Medford who fail to do their duty were flayed alive by Evangelist Griffith Jones last night before an audience that filled Salvation Army hall. Every minister in Medford, with possibly one exception, had places on the platform. The speaker from Los Angeles declared that the Medford ministers are "the most Godly, spiritual group of men I have ever met."

"You are neither hot nor cold," said Evangelist Jones, as he launched a tirade against professing Christians who make a great show and promise much, but who fail when an opportunity to join in a great revival is offered. Then quoting from John in the Apocalypse he continued "and because thou art neither hot nor cold, but lukewarm I will spew thee out of my mouth," saith the Lord.

"Many of the so-called Christians in Medford Churches are only at Haran," said the speaker. "They are too close to the plains of Sodom to even be comfortable. They have a show of religion, but they deny the power. Unless you realize the opportunity that is now offered to you, God will indeed spew thee out of His mouth and the great day of reckoning will have come for many of you."

"Church edifices in Medford are certainly beautiful, but my friends they are like whitened sepulchres; on the outside they are white, clean and beautiful, but within they are full of dead men's bones."

"Here you have one of the most beautiful cities in the State of Oregon. You have the newspapers with you. There is everything that would make a great revival and yet you church members hesitate. You are like Lot when Abraham offered him his choice and he hesitated and then chose the plains of Sodom."

"Fire and brimstone rained down from Heaven and destroyed Sodom. What will you have to say in the great day of judgment when the God of all the earth asks you why you did not choose to come out on God's side and stand by these ministers who are trying to arouse the Christian spirit in this city?"

Evangelist Jones was asked to conduct a series of evangelistic meetings in Jacksonville. A delegation waited on him last night and will meet with Bert Smith today.

Ministers of Medford, however, are determined to begin the revival here in Medford. The other cities can follow but the big meetings are to be started here they say. The attendance last night was such that the revival supporters are greatly encouraged.

Captain Pitt of the Salvation Army was given a great boost by the Evangelist for his work in Medford. His wife, Mrs. Pitt, came in for special mention also and it was announced that another meeting will be held in Salvation Army hall tonight and tomorrow night.

Evangelist Jones declared he has been treated in a princely manner by the business men of Medford. He explained however, that he is here to start a revival and he told his hearers that he intends to give them the "naked truth."

He stated that he wants nothing from the people of Medford but their co-operation and their prayers. "The Lord will do the rest," he said.

"Stand still and see the salvation of the Lord" is the text for the sermon tonight. Attorney Jones will describe Moses when he was leading the children of Israel out of Egypt. He will picture the great leader with the mountains before him, the desert on one side, the Red Sea on the other and Pharaoh following with chariots and horsemen. The speaker will then tell how the Israelites escaped from the trap.

SALEM, Ore., June 23.—The following opinions were handed down by the supreme court today:

Louie McKennon vs. Lee Warnick, sheriff of Union county; appellant; appeal from Union county; suit to determine validity of personal property tax lien. Opinion by Justice Brown. Judge J. W. Knowles affirmed.

In the matter of the estate of Henry F. Perkins, deceased and T. B. Kay, state treasurer, appellant, vs. F. L. Myers, administrator; suit to collect inheritance tax; appeal from Union county. Opinion by Justice Burnett. Judge J. W. Knowles affirmed.

J. F. Phy, C. J. Clark and L. A. Stoop, partners, vs. M. D. Allen, appellant, appeal from Union county; action for collection of brokers' commission. Opinion by Justice Bean. Judge J. W. Knowles affirmed.
