

ITALIANS CONFER UPON WAR DEBT

WASHINGTON, June 25.—(A. P.)—The Italian war debt to the United States today became the seventh to be formally started on its way to a funding settlement when Ambassador De Martino and Mario Alberti, representing the Italian government, had an engagement with Secretary Mellon and Under Secretary Winton, chairman and secretary of the American debt commission, to begin their discussion.

The Italian obligation is approximately \$2,138,000,000 and the Italian government desires that its payment be spread over a period of years. The length of time to be allowed therefore constitutes one of the important phases of the question which the conference will take up.

Secrecy is to surround all of the conferences on the Italian debt.

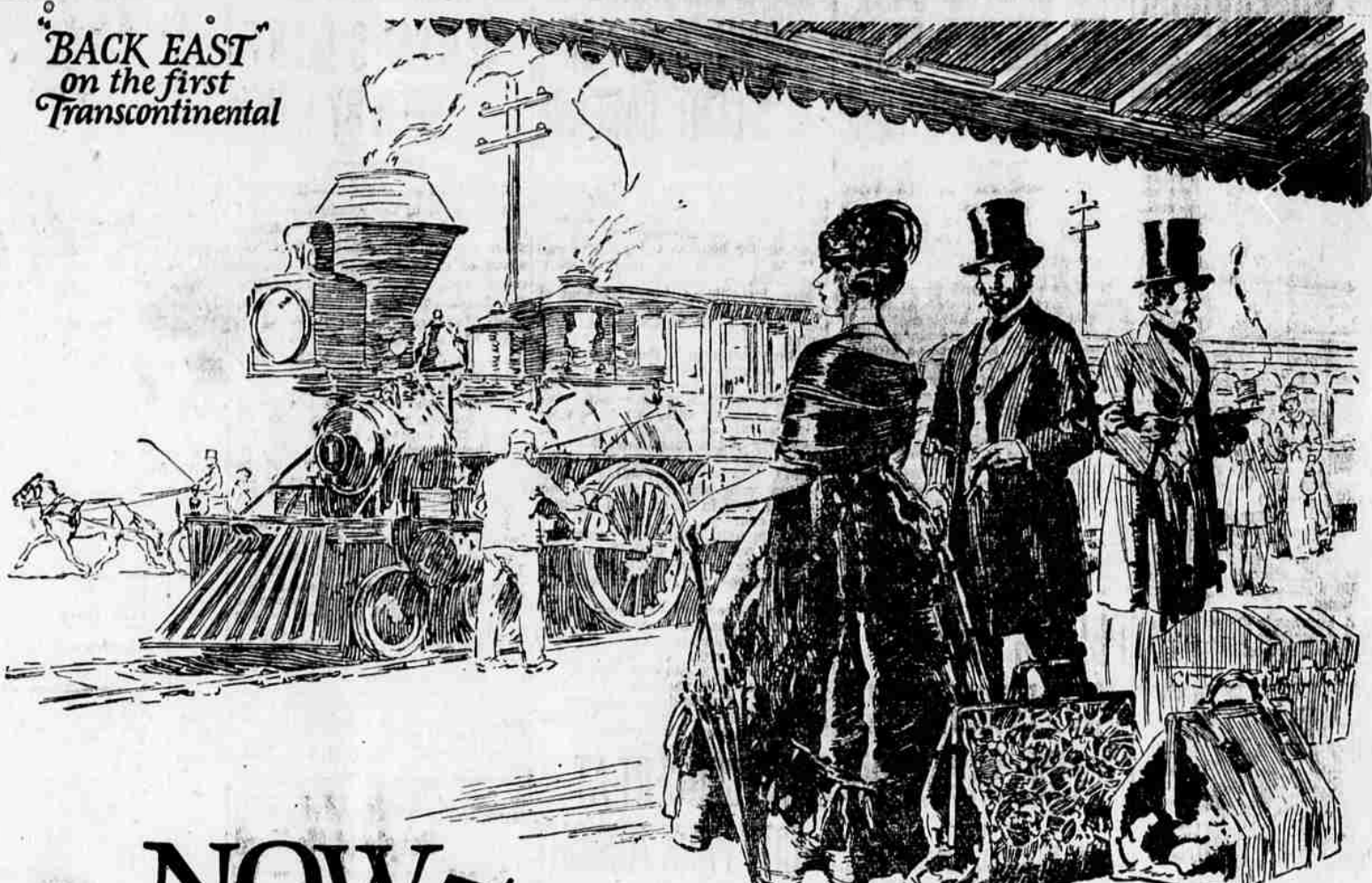
