DEATH OF DAN CAMERON BLOW TO ROGUE RIVER

 ROGUE RIVER, June 24.—Dan Cameron, an old miner of Pleasant Creek, died June 21st at the Sacred Heart hospital at Medford at the ripe old age of 83 years. Mr. Cameron has been actively engaged in placer mining on Pleasant creek since about 1884. He was particularly well known in Rogue River and in his quiet way had accumulated a good many friends who will learn with regret of his passing. He was of Scotch-English descent and what relatives he was known to have lived in Scotland. The funeral will be conducted Friday, June 26 at 1 p. m. from the Conger Funeral Parlor at Medford and interment in the L. O. O. F. cemetery.

Fred Horton was seriously injured Sunday afternoon while playing baseball. He was stationed at third base and when one of the Jacksonville men made a run for that base in some manner he struck Fred with his knee with such force as to break three of his ribs and causing other internal injuries and he lies at a hospital in Grants Pass in a critical condition. An operation was performed Monday evening in an effort to save his life, but the doctors hold out little hope to his relatives and friends for his recovery.
