BRITISH TITLE IN GOLF GOES TO JIM BARNES

PRESTWICK, Scotland, June 26.—(A. P.) Jim Barnes, American professional, won the British open golf championship today with 309 for the 72 holes. MacDonald Smith, who led Barnes by five points at the start of today's play, broke badly in the final round and failed to make the 68 necessary to win. Smith's total was 303.

Joe Kirkwood, the third American entrant, after putting himself out of the running with the poor rounds yesterday totaling 182, who sound golf today and returned 76 for each round for a total of 314. He probably will be among the leading ten players.

The veteran Ted Ray, with a fine last round of 73, tied Arthur Compston for second place, having 301 each.

Ray had to make a six yard putt for a birdie two at the eighteenth to tie Barnes, but was a foot short of the cup.

WILLING BEATEN, EGAN MOVES TO THE SEMI-FINALS

SEATTLE, June 26.—Lee Still was one up on Forrest Watson and H. Chandler Egan two up on W. J. Noonan at the end of the first half of the semi-final round in the Pacific Northwest amateur golf tournament at Tacoma today.

TACOMA, June 26.—Forest Watson, Spokane, Inland Empire champion, defeated Dr. O. F. Willing, defending champion, in the third round of match play for the 1925 Pacific Northwest amateur golf championship 2 and 1, in a thrilling match yesterday.

Lee Still of the Seattle golf club, defeated his club mate "Bon" Steln, who is present holder of the British Columbia championship, five and four and will meet Watson in the semi-finals.

H. Chandler Egan, Medford, Ore., several times northwest amateur champion, eliminated one Tacoma entry, Leroy Pratt, Jr., six and five, although Pratt, playing in fine form, had held him even for the first eighteen holes. Egan will meet W. J. Noonan, Tacoma, in the semi-finals.

Noonan eliminated Roy Moe of the Eugene, Ore., country club four and two, holing one 100-yard mashie shot and any number of long putts to do so.

Playing the morning round Willing was two up on Watson with a 38 to the Spokane lad's 40, but the next nine holes developed the most thrilling golf of the tournament. Every hole but the eighteenth was played in under par figures, Watson's medal for the nine showing only 31 strokes while Willing had taken but 32, and the Portlander was still two up, a difference of two strokes at the seventeenth hole, account for the difference between the medal score and the match play result.

Had form was shown by all four participants in the semi-finals. The men who displayed such splendid form Thursday faltered noticeably in their games this morning over eighteen holes, but hoped to improve upon their games in the afternoon eighteen holes.

Both Watson and Steln were constantly in trouble while Noonan was far off form.

Egan finished the first nine holes three up on Noonan, but the Tacoma man retrieved one of those holes on the second nine.

Ray Casey Defeated WIMBLEDON, England, June 26.—(A. P.) Ray Casey of San Francisco, was eliminated from the all-England tennis championships in straight sets, 8-6, 4-4, 6-1 today by Rene LaCoste, the young French star who was a finalist for singles honors last year.

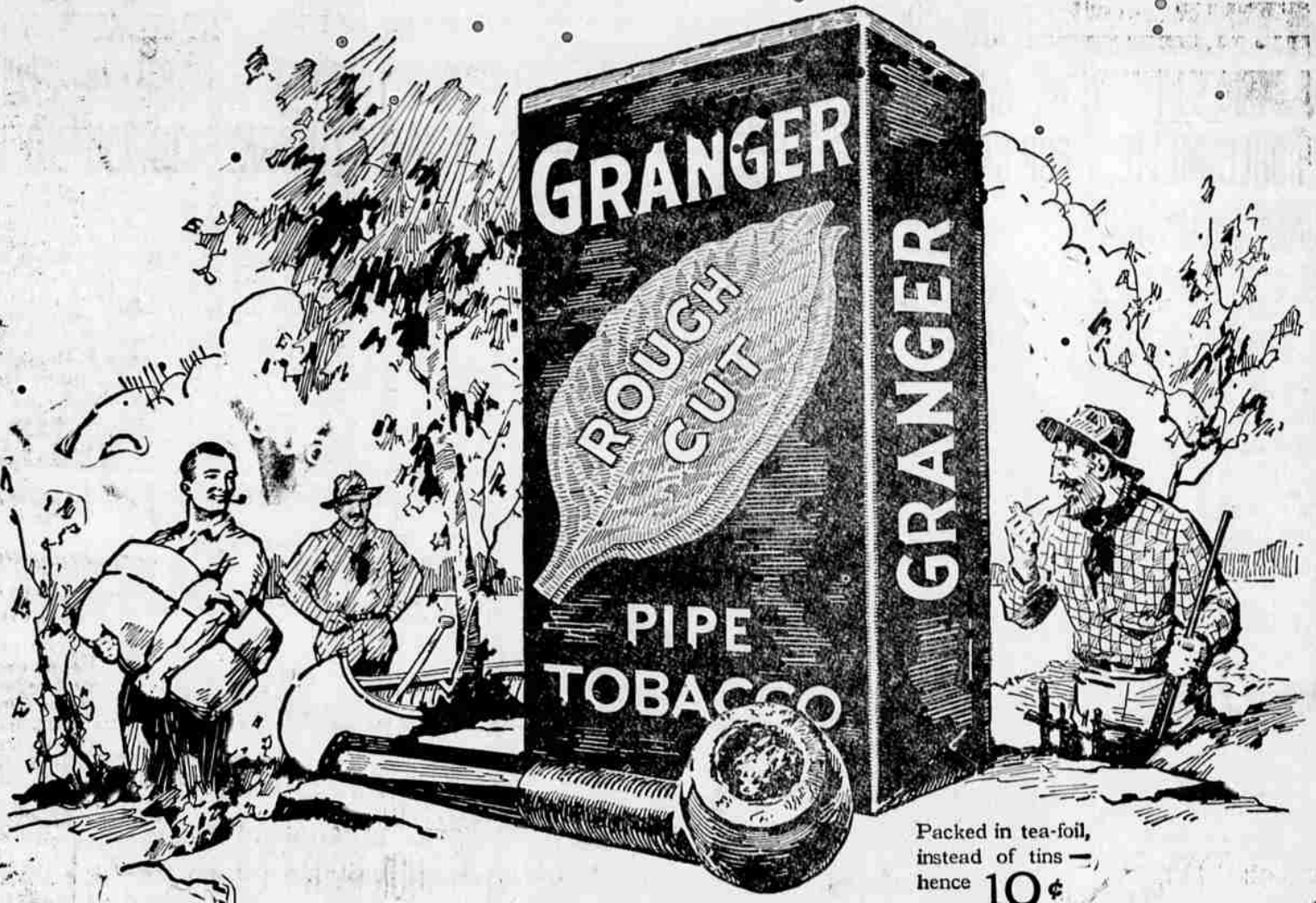
IOWA MAN IS NAMED FINLAND MINISTER
