

FOREST FIRES IN THE WILLAMETTE UNDER CONTROL

SALEM, Ore., June 26.—A cool night with heavy dew falling and a north wind blowing the fires back over the burned territory have returned the forest fires in the Siletz basin today. Yesterday the Willamette Valley lumber camps were in danger from rapidly spreading flames but the change of wind reduced the menace for the time being.

Will Caldwell, ranger lookout at Bald mountain reported no new fires this morning. The Siletz basin, filled with smoke and the old fires are burning slowly. A fire near Mills City is under control.

The fire at the head of the Little Luckiamute near the top of the Coast range was watched many miles away last night. It was burning brightly and the reflection of the flames on the smoky clouds in the west was watched by the people in Dallas and surrounding valley towns.

Secretary Jardine On Relation Electricity To Agriculture

SAN FRANCISCO, June 26.—(Special.)—One of the most important addresses made this week at the annual convention of the National Electric Light association at San Francisco, was that of Hon. William M. Jardine, secretary of agriculture. Secretary Jardine is a real "dirt farmer" and one of the best posted men in the country on the relation of electricity to agriculture, having been chairman of this movement in Kansas Agricultural college for several years before accepting his present cabinet portfolio in Washington.

There are approximately 52000 rural users of electricity in Oregon and it is expected that this number will grow rapidly as soon as the investigation activities now under way have been carried to the point where definite recommendations may be made.

NORTHERN PACIFIC TO EXTEND LINES

MINNEAPOLIS, June 26.—Construction of a \$3,000,000 40 miles of railroad in the Clearwater timber district of Idaho to serve the largest white pine lumber mill in the Pacific northwest was announced today by Charles Donnelly, president of the Northern Pacific railway. The line will run northeast from Oro Fino, Idaho, and will be constructed by the Northern Pacific and Union Pacific railroads to serve the Clearwater Timber company, a Weyerhaeuser interest which plans to erect a huge lumber mill at Lewiston, Idaho.

ESCAPED CONVICT TAKEN ON RANCH

TACOMA, June 26.—Morton Hansen, escaped McNeil Island convict, was captured late last night by Guard Pangen in the basement of the John Holmes ranch near the prison, where he had gone for food. Hansen's capture resulted from clues picked up by prison officials when they found several jars of jam in a machine shop on the prison grounds identified as that stolen from the farm home.
