### BEST FISHING AT DIAMOND LAKE FOR PAST 5 YEARS

DIAMOND LAKE, June 25.—Better fishing conditions prevail at Diamond Lake than at any time in the past five years, is the opinion of persons well acquainted with Diamond Lake fishing. Scarcely a person venturing on the lake with a piece of tackle has failed to bring in a handsome string.

The fish are slightly smaller than in previous years, but are present

in larger quantities. The catches have been averaging around three pounds to the fish, although some of the rainbow trout, the only species of fish in the lake, have tipped the scales at seven and eight pounds. Last year the largest specimen caught in the lake weighed 11 pounds.

W. T. Robertshaw, of England, who left today for New Orleans on his way home, spoke very highly of Diamond Lake fishing.

"I have fished in Canada, England, Norway, Sweden, Scotland and Ireland," said Mr. Robertshaw as he was preparing to leave, "but I have never seen such good fishing as here at Diamond Lake. The fish are in large quantities, they are very fat, and taste exceptionally well."

A large number of sportsmen have been taking advantage of the opportunity offered, and over the weekend have kept every available boat in constant use. Although 42 boats,

including four power boats, are available, a good many persons have been compelled to frequent the waiting list.

Road conditions into the lake are good, all travel coming in by way of Union Creek on the Medford-Crater lake highway. Most cars are able to make the trip from Medford in five hours. A road crew is taking out the rough spots and widening the road between Union creek and the lake.

Reservations indicate that a large crowd will be on hand at the lake over the Fourth of July.
