### TOURIST TRAVEL IN ASHLAND MAKES A NEW RECORD

ASHLAND, June 27.—The out-of-state registrations for cars have already surpassed any June registration since the bureau was established here with three days remaining to swell the number. With the exception of four days, the registration has reached more than 100 each day, and on three days more than 200. June 1st saw the highest mark set, with 244 cars registering, the highest recorded in the state of out-of-state cars. There were 3674 out-of-state cars registered up until June 26.

### Sports HORNBY RETAINS BATTING LEAD IN NATIONAL LEAGUE

CHICAGO, June 27.—(A. P.)—George Sleser, pilot of the St. Louis Americans and Al Simmons of the Athletics, are the first major leaguers to pass the century mark in hitting for 1925.

Latest statistics show that Sleser has collected 103 hits and Simmons 101. The figures include games of Wednesday.

The batting leaders of the American league are in the same position they were a week ago, with Sammy Hale of the Athletics topping the list with 421. Red Wings of the Tigers is second with 419, followed by Ilee of the Browns with 419 and Ty Cobb with 401.

Ken Williams, the St. Louis slugger and Bob Meusel of the Yankees failed to increase their home run totals, the Yankee still being in front with sixteen, with Williams one behind. Williams, however, increased his total base mark to 175.

In base stealing, Johnny Mostil of the White Sox continues to lead the pack with a total of 22.

Maxey Carey and Clyde Barnhart of Pittsburgh have made an appearance among the leading batters of the National league. Barnhart jumped from fifth to third place with an average of .393, and Carey from twelfth to sixth with .373.

There has been no stopping of Rogers Hornsby of the Cardinals, who remains safely in the lead with .427, eleven points more than he had a week ago. Hornsby collected 14 hits in his last seven games. Four were homers. He holds leadership of the majors for home run hitting with 21.

Hazen Cuyler, another Pirate, continues to hold the honors as the best run getter with 68.

### SMITH'S COLLAPSE IN OPEN TOURNEY GOLF SENSATION

LONDON, June 27.—(A. P.)—Long Jim Barnes, American professional golfer, was bound for his old home in Cornwall today to receive congratulations of his mother as newly crowned open champion of Great Britain. He finished his gruelling competition at Prestwick, Scotland, yesterday, with two rounds of 79-74, which added to Thursday's 78-77, gave him an even 300, or one stroke below the two Britishers on his heels, the veteran Ted Ray and the rising Archie Compston.

MacDonald Smith, the American who had been favored for the title after his record of 69 of Thursday afternoon, broke wide open on the last 18 holes and took a bad 82 to finish third with 201. Abe Mitchell, long driving Britisher was fourth with 395 and fifth place was divided among five Britons, including the veteran, J. H. Taylor.

Joe Kirkwood, the third invading American, managed to land among the first ten with 314 by doing two 76's after his poor start of 162 for the first two holes Thursday.

The British golf experts seemingly are impressed more by the fact that Smith lost than that Barnes won. Smith lost the favorite and his collapse yesterday is termed as one of the most astonishing ever seen in any open championship.
