H. CHANDLER EGAN EQUALS M'LEAY'S RECORD IN GOLF

TACOMA, Wash., June 28.—H. Chandler Egan of Medford, in winning the crown for the fourth time Saturday, equalled the record made by Roderick L. MacLennan of Waverly 20 years ago.

Egan won his first Northwest title over the Tacoma country club course just 10 years ago, defeating Paul Ford of Seattle. Five years later, he annexed the title at Vancouver, B. C., defeating Rudy Wilhelm and two years ago at Seattle he annexed a victory over Lee Stell.

Saturday Forest Watson, who has fought hard to climb to the top of the ladder, fell before his brilliant recovery. This course is just built for trouble shooters. Egan appeared to be more brilliant in his recovery and, although the morning medal round was nothing to rave about, the new champion was two over fours in the afternoon when the match ended.

Watson was forced to meet two good trouble shooters in two days and while he succeeded in eliminating Lee Stell, the steadiness of the veteran was too much for him. Egan's wood shooting had been off color all week, but he did not let that worry him in the heat and during the afternoon round he poked out some very brilliant shots. Egan finished one up in the morning round, in which but one par hole was registered and that by Egan with a 10-foot putt on the tenth.

At the turn in the morning Watson was one down and Egan played par golf after leaving the tenth green, annexing two more holes, which put him four up at the end of the round.

Watson lost the 14th, when, after placing his drive and having his second caught in a trap, he made a brilliant recovery, only to miss his putt altogether. The Spokane player lost the 17th when he sliced again and failed to clear the trees with his niblick.

After halving the first hole in the afternoon, Watson won the second with a birdie four. He pushed his drive off the fairway into a road and made a great brassie shot to the green. Egan played a great shot over the trees, but failed to reach the green and was short on his pitch up. His putt was dead to the hole while Egan's putt ran off line.

Egan had a brilliant drive on the third, but Watson made a nice run up after being short on his mashie and halved the hole. Egan lost a chance to win the fourth when he three-putted after reaching the 45-yard hole with a drive and a wonderful midiron. Watson was just off the edge of the fairway with his drive and a brassie landed beyond the green and he pitched over a kop, but ran off the green. He pitched back to the green nicely and took a putt for a half.

The champion hooked his drive into the trees on the fifth, but Watson was short on his mashie and had a chance for the hole, but was not up on a 20-foot putt.

On the sixth, Watson's tee shot was trapped, while Egan was nicely on the green with a five foot putt for a two. Watson exploded his ball out of the bunker and landed on the side of a lay, and after being short on his pitch shot, conceded the hole.

Egan was straight off the seventh tee, while Watson hooked on the fourth fairway, but made a wonderful approach shot and sank a 20-foot putt for a birdie three and win, which put him three down again. The eighth was halved with five, Egan missing a three foot putt, after Watson had pushed his iron into the rough and about 20 yards in front of the green.

Watson ran down a birdie four on the ninth by sinking a 15-footer, while Egan was away short on his approach to pin.

The best two holes of the halved and Watson lost one of the holes he had regained by three-putting the 12th green. Egan's drive on the 13th was trapped, but he got out fairly well and missed his putt, while Watson put his approach shot close enough to have Egan concede him the hole. The 14th was halved in fours, when Egan laid Watson a half stymie. On the 15th, Watson pushed his tee shot into the rough and after making a great out his ball bounded into a trap and he barely got out. Egan got off the tee nicely and was over the hole with his mashie, but put his putt dead for a four. The win on that hole dorned the match and Watson's last chance faded when he hooked his tee shot on the 16th and his brassie to the green went off line.

Egan was straight off the tee and although short on his second approach shot to the pin, while Watson over approached, succeeded in running down a 20-foot for a half. Egan having no trouble running down a four-footer ending the match.

The finals of this year's tournament were not as brilliant as in the past few years, but nevertheless the gallery was rewarded with some great shots.
