NEW YORK, July 1.—(A. P.)—A disturbance of marked intensity has been registered in baseball. Where once stood a peaceful Philadelphia and a fearsome Giant, there are now an astute Senator and a belligerent Pirate.

The mighty Johnson came forth yesterday to lift his Washington brethren to the heights over the Athletics. Meanwhile, Jack Scott killed the Giant hopes by failing to halt the Braves.

His aggregate of 153 probably will be good enough to qualify.

Kirkwood took three putts on each of four different greens and twice drove wildly but otherwise played very good golf. Abe Mitchell had another sterling 70 to lead the field of more than 100 professional golfers with 149.

## TOMORROW'S FIGHT TO BE RADIO CAST BY N. Y. STATIONS

NEW YORK, July 1.—(A. P.)—Mickey Walker tomorrow will shake his second attempt to enter the small circle of great boxers who have ruled two classes.

Against Mike McGuire, former light-heavyweight, in a fight at Newark, N. J., Walker, the welterweight champion, failed in his initial effort last winter because the New Jersey boxing law forbids decisions. He was given an unanimous newspaper verdict for a knockout.

Walker is scheduled for his second attempt tomorrow night at the middleweight title of Harry Greb tomorrow night at the Polo grounds in one of two fifteen-round bouts featuring a card for the Italian hospital fund. This time there will be judges for a decision and the title can pass on points.

Grob and Walker took their last strenuous workouts, the former at a New York gymnasium, the latter at his camp in Stamford, N. J.

Jim Slattery of Buffalo, N. Y., who means Dave Shute in a six-round bout, is expected here today after having conditioned for the fight in his home city. Shute is already on the scene, as are Jack Sharkey and Joe Lynch, rival bantams of many years, who look in the evening four rounds of the show.

Unlike recent big fights here, tomorrow night's program will be radio cast by station WGPB. The first contest begins between 8:15 and 8:30 daylight saving time.

## GAIN SHOWN IN RETURNS INCOME TAXES IN 1924

SALEM, July 1.—(Special)—The total number of federal income tax returns filed throughout the United States by individuals in 1924, showing income received during the calendar year 1923, was 7,694,321. The aggregate net income reported in these returns was \$26,226,327,843 and the tax \$793,987,165, which represents the greatest number of returns filed and the largest aggregate net income reported for any year.

For the state of Oregon the number filed was 69,123 which showed net income amounting to \$196,493,324 and tax \$2,899,330. The number of returns was the largest for any year.

As compared with the preceding year the figures for the United States show an increase of 316,810 or 13.42 per cent in the number of returns filed and increase in the total net income reported amounting to \$5,969,125,313 or 23.44 per cent, but a decrease of \$157,955,143 or 18.24 per cent in the total tax.

In the state of Oregon the increase in the number of returns was 7244 or 11.71 per cent, the increase in the total net income amounted to \$29,267,992 or 15.4 per cent, and the decrease in the tax was \$1,849,401 or 21.61 per cent.
