

# KLAN WILL ASK PRESIDENT TO REVIEW PARADE

### Mr. Coolidge Finds No Rest From Cares at Summer Home—Klan Issue Presents Knotty Problem—Coal Strike Another Worry.

SWAMPSCOTT, Mass., July 2.—(A. P.)—President Coolidge is reaching the conclusion that a president, regardless of where he goes cannot evade the cares of his office. Coming to the seashore for relief from the ever-present heat of Washington, the president is finding that although removed from the seat of government, there are problems to plague a vacationist.

Mr. Coolidge was confronted today with several issues, still somewhat aloof, but never-the-less holding vexatious probabilities.

The Ku Klux Klan controversy threatens to take a new turn as a result of the announced intention of the organization to invite the president to review its parade and address its members in Washington early in August. No formal invitation has yet been received but it is considered unlikely here that the president will be able to accept, particularly as he has indicated that he still will be summering here at the time.

The announcement that an invitation would be extended, however, has brought communications to Mr. Coolidge from a number of individuals and organizations opposed to the Klan, urging him to emphatically decline and, in some instances, appealing to him to do something to prevent the holding of the Washington meeting.

Another cloud on the horizon is the possibility of a strike between anthracite operators and miners over a new wage scale. The president is watching developments with interest, chiefly through the newspapers, but indicating what he will do if a crisis arises.

## The Noted Dead

MANISTEE, Mich., July 2.—Professor Walter Scott Hendrixson, 66, of Grinnell college, Grinnell, Iowa, was found dead in his cottage at Portage Point, near here, yesterday. The discovery of the body was made by Albert Sigam, Butler college student, who is working as a bellboy at the Portage Point inn during the summer.

Mrs. Hendrixson had wired to authorities here asking them to locate her husband. She said she had not heard from him for several weeks. Coroner Bradford said he believed Professor Hendrixson had been dead ten days.

Professor Hendrixson was widely known in the field of chemistry and as a lecturer. He was born at Felicity, Ohio, was graduated from Christian college, Meroma, Ind., and had studied at Harvard, Berlin and Göttingen universities.

In the room where the body was found were his suitcase, packed, and a railroad ticket. Circumstances pointed to a natural death caused by an internal hemorrhage.

## MORE WOMEN AND CHILDREN IN CHINA MOVE TO SAFETY

NEW YORK, July 2.—(A. P.)—Women and children of the foreign colonies at Hainan and Kwantung all have been removed to safer points, the Presbyterian board of foreign missions was advised today in a cablegram from its China consul.

"Leading men have remained at Hainan," the message said, "but almost all other foreigners have left for Hongkong or elsewhere. No further news."

# BERGDOLL SAYS HIS POT OF GOLD WAS VERY OWN

### Draft Evader in Sworn Affidavit, Made in Baden, Germany, Denies Mother Buried Any Part of His Fortune—Mother Wins Decision.

PHILADELPHIA, July 2.—Grover C. Bergdoll says that the pot of gold he buried in the Maryland hills contains more than \$249,000.

This was revealed yesterday in a sworn statement by him submitted at a hearing of counter-suits, filed by Mrs. Emma C. Bergdoll, his mother, and Thomas W. Miller, alien property custodian. The statement, witnessed by a notary public in Baden, Germany, was sent to Mrs. Bergdoll to aid in her contention that she had turned over all of her son's property to the alien property custodian.

Bergdoll has been living in Baden since a spectacular escape in 1920. An intimation that his mother had buried a large sum of money also was contained in the statement.

"The \$195,000 which my mother claims to have buried is absolutely her own," said the statement. "The \$249,000 which I concealed, (the gold buried in the ground) and the gold notes I took along to Europe were my own property. No person living outside of myself has the slightest idea as to where I took the gold after I loaded it in my car in Pennsylvania."

Bergdoll escaped from army guards at his mother's home here while on a trip to dig up the treasure after he had been sentenced to serve five years in prison for evading the draft. A master in chancery recommended that the custodian be ordered to return to Mrs. Bergdoll \$140,000 in cash and securities worth several hundred thousand dollars.

## 6 Cars at Cent. Point Are Robbed of Tools

Six automobiles parked along the streets of Central Point were robbed of all the tools they contained late last night or early this morning by unknown persons. No clues were left, but police officials are at work on the case and it is expected that developments will soon be reported.

# BRYAN IS BEATEN BY ROCKEFELLER IN CHURCH ROW

### Fundamentalists Are Snowed Under By Modernists 912 to 364 in Test Vote in Seattle Over Seating of Fosdick Delegates From N. Y.

SEATTLE, July 2.—(A. P.) Modernists defeated fundamentalists, 912 to 364, here today, seating in the northern Baptist convention a delegation of the Park Avenue church, New York City.

The Park Avenue congregation includes John D. Rockefeller, John D. Rockefeller, Jr., and members of their families.

Dr. Harry Emerson Fosdick, whose modernist views caused his elimination from the pastorate of the First Presbyterian church, New York City, became pastor of the Park Avenue church this spring.

SEATTLE, July 2.—(A. P.) Staved off for two days, the battle between modernists and fundamentalists broke on the floor of the nineteenth annual meeting of the Northern Baptist convention here today. The question was whether to seat four delegates from the Park Avenue church, New York City.

This question came to a debate when a fundamentalist moved against a ruling of the chair. The ruling was that the Park Avenue church having met its financial obligations and cooperated in the work of the church, that congregation's chosen representatives could not be barred.

## U. S. S. Oregon Ceremony Friday

PORTLAND, Ore., July 2.—On the 27th anniversary of her historic engagement in the battle of SantiaGo, the U. S. S. Oregon, one of the bulldozers of the navy, will be presented by the government to the state of Oregon tomorrow with elaborate ceremonies.

This famous old battleship, spared by the Washington treaty on armaments on condition that she be used only as a relic, now lies in the Willamette river under a bridge here, silenced, partly dismantled. Her breeches are welded and her muzzles spiked.

The Oregon will be manned in future by a superintendent, two assistants and a watchman and within certain hours daily will be open to public inspection.

# MEDFORD PRAISED IN RADIO SENT TO NEWARK, N. JERSEY

Medford will be given much publicity throughout the eastern and middle-west radio world by I. R. Nelson of the I. R. Nelson company of Newark, N. J., who with his secretary, J. E. Seymour, and son, E. F. Nelson, arrived in the city yesterday afternoon on an auto tour of the west and Pacific coast.

On this trip Mr. Nelson is representing the WAAM radio broadcasting station of Newark, and each night wherever he is, he wires back a code letter about interesting features of that community, which is broadcasted by WAAM the next evening.

Last evening Mr. Nelson wired back a code from Medford a letter covering the Merrick auto camp, the local Chamber of Commerce and the local branch of the American Automobile association, and this message was highly laudatory of Medford.

Mr. Nelson and party spent today at Crater Lake, expecting to return tonight and send back a code message on the lake.

## MacMillan Delayed By Stormy Weather

WASHINGTON, July 2.—(A. P.) The Bowdoin, flagship of the MacMillan arctic expedition is at Battledore, Labrador, awaiting the arrival of its companion ship, the Peary.

Fog, ice floes and a falling barometer indicate that the weather may delay temporarily the departure of the expedition even after the arrival of the other ship.
