CALL ATTENTION TO REGULATIONS FOR JULY 4TH

The following regulations are called to the attention of citizens planning outings in the woods over the Fourth of July, by the local forest service office:

"It shall be unlawful during the closed season," states the Oregon forest fire laws, "for any person to throw away any lighted tobacco, cigars, cigarettes, matches, firecrackers, or other lighted material on any forest land, private road, public highway or railroad right-of-way within this state. Any person violating the provisions of this section shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction hereof, shall be punished by a fine of not less than twenty-five dollars (\$25) nor more than seventy-five dollars (\$75)."

The regulations governing the use of the national forests prohibit the throwing or placing of a burning cigarette, cigar, match, pipe heel, firecracker or any kind of substance, or the discharge of any kind of fireworks in any place where it may start a fire, and at the same time the state law also applies to the national forest land, particularly that relating to fireworks.

Camp fire permits are also necessary and these may be had at the forest service office in the Federal building, which is open from 7 A. M. to 7 P. M. every day, including Sundays and holidays.
