CARPENTER'S UNION MEETS TOMORROW

Don Cameron of Indianapolis, Ind., national representative of the Carpenters International Union, is spending several days in the city in connection with the meeting of the local union tomorrow evening at 128 North Grape street.

O. C. Young, general representative of the American Federation of Labor unions, and Ed Stack, secretary of the Oregon State Federation of Labor, will be the speakers of the evening on current labor topics. The general public is invited to attend as the meeting will be open to all. FOUR INJURED IN 2 AUTO CRASHES

At present they are registered at the Holland Hotel apparently quite recovered from the effects of the accident. Lee Caton, of the Jackson County Creamery, also suffered misfortune last night when he collided with a car driven by J. G. Cozert of Ashland on South Riverside near Miss June Earhart's residence. The Cozert car was proceeding several hundred feet ahead when one of the steering rods broke throwing the front wheels out of line, and apparently Mr. Caton in the car behind did not notice that Cozert was stopping as he squarely struck the rear of the car.

The camp grounds at both resorts were also crowded with pleasure seekers, and the lodge dining rooms at both places were unable to feed many of the hungry hordes who sought dining accommodations.
