2 COLLEGE BOYS FACE TERMS AS HIGHWAY BANDITS

BUFFALO, Mont., July 7.—Mark Mills, 21, of Apple, Mo., and Carl Soffert, 20, of Tulsa, Okla., president and vice-president, respectively, of the senior class of the Missouri School of Mines are expected to plead guilty this afternoon to charges of highway robbery, carrying a sentence of from one to 20 years in the state penitentiary. They were captured yesterday after a gun battle following their holdup of Manager George Forsythe of Columbia Gardens, a summer resort here, and their escape with \$5170. Mills was shot in the leg and shoulder before he surrendered.

The money was recovered. The boys said they wanted it to complete their college education.
