PIERCE AGENTS SEIZE STILL IN WILLAMETTE RIVER

SALEM, Ore., July 8.—Capture of agents working directly out of the governor's office of a still late yesterday afternoon on a bush island in the Willamette river about a mile and a quarter from St. Paul, the county, revealed the largest illicit still plant yet seized on the coast, according to officials. The plant including two stills, each as large as the still seized at Mount Angel a few months ago. In addition, a still was made of 30 vats, each containing from 150 to 200 gallons of cognac mash, two four horsepower boilers and the complete equipment of a top-to-date distillery.

The still was located on a canvas structure, about forty feet square, concealed in the brush on the island. The agents, W. W. and C. Christensen, went directly from the governor's office to the state prohibition director. Since June 3 they had been working on a tip that a small still was operating somewhere in the St. Paul district.

While ranging through the brush last night looking for the still near the river somewhere, they sighted two men on the island who they were certain were connected with stilling or bootlegging operations. They were just pushing off from the island in a small boat. The agents shouted at them to stop, but the men rowed vigorously away. The agent let loose a fusillade of bullets, they stated that the men made good their getaway. The agents stated they made no effort to hit them.

ASTORIA PREPARES FOR WELCOME TO CRUISING MIDDIES

ASTORIA, Ore., June 8.—Tentative plans for the entertainment of the officers, midshipmen and sailors who will visit Astoria July 19 to 21 on the three battleships taking the Annapolis men on their summer cruise, have been completed by a chamber of commerce committee and submitted to Rear Admiral Vogelsang, cruise commander.

Members of the Portland and Astoria navy base committee will be in the need of the base before Secretary of the Navy Curtis D. LeMay and will give him every opportunity to inspect the site of the base.

The ships are scheduled to arrive here about noon on July 19 Sunday afternoon and evening will be given over to Seattle no attempt being made to entertain the navy men in Astoria. Monday morning a parade of the midshipmen, officers and cadets will be held on the streets of Astoria and will be followed by a boxing smoker.

In the afternoon baseball games will be played between teams from the ships and in the evening there will be dances in several Astoria halls for the midshipmen and sailors and a banquet for Secretary of the Navy Wilbur and the officers of the squadron. The ships will leave some time Tuesday.
