An exceedingly interesting and informational and instructive discourse on "Life in the Northern Country" was given by Rotarian Emil Mohr of the form of an impromptu talk, and was very highly appreciated and enjoyed by all present. Emil succeeded in dispelling the minds of many of the Rotarians from erroneous ideas relative to real life in the Klondike, and pictured the Klondike in glowing terms as a place where one will find absolute true brotherhood, where right exists to the exclusion of wrong, light to the exclusion of darkness, and where crime is practically unknown. Emil illustrated his remarks by personal experiences showing the existence among the people of the Klondike of a splendid spirit of charity, benevolence, fraternity and brotherly love, and stated that the years spent there by him never would be regretted.

CROP CONDITIONS IN OREGON GOOD EXPERTS REPORT

PORTLAND, Ore., July 8.—The summary of weather and crop conditions in Oregon for the week ending July 7, issued today by the United States weather bureau shows conditions generally good.

The report follows:

The weather was generally moderately warm, though on several mornings the temperature fell rather low. Precipitation was confined to a few scattered showers in northern localities and some light misty rain along the coast. In Malheur county some local damage was done by hail, high wind, and heavy rain. Water for irrigation is generally abundant, but the breaking of a reservoir in eastern Baker county is expected to cause a local shortage of water later.

Results: Winter and early sown spring grain is maturing rapidly, and harvest is well under way in the miller sections. The extreme heat of the previous week caused some damage to small grain, but was not so great as was feared. Corn is doing well.

Fruits: Early apples are in market in a number of places. The main crop of apples is sizing well, but some injury from heat is reported. The ripening of cherries is extending to some of the later districts. Picking of raspberries and loganberries is advancing rapidly. Loganberries were somewhat hurt by the heat of the previous week. Black raspberries are more plentiful than usual. Apricots and early peaches are becoming more plentiful in market.

Meadows, pastures and ranges: The second crop of alfalfa is likely to be good in Umatilla county. Most clover, vetch and hay in the Willamette valley has been cut. Vetch and oats generally have good results; clover was good in some localities but other localities had very little following the unfavorable season of 1924. Hail is in progress in southern counties. Low ranges are drying but an abundance of feed continues at higher levels. Water on ranges is generally sufficient.

Livestock: Some lambs and range cattle have been marketed in good condition. Stock is generally in good condition.

Miscellaneous: Planting of the late crop of potatoes is mostly completed and the crop is coming up well. Tomatoes are ripening in Umatilla county. In the Willamette valley there is complaint of early going to seed.

Hops are being pulled; much of the crop is ready to pull; much of the crop is short.

A large acreage of broccoli is being planted. Unirrigated gardens are poor.
