

C. E. CONVENTION AGAIN ENDORSES A WORLD COURT

PORTLAND, Ore., July 7.—(A. P.)—Congress is called upon to support every effort toward limitation of armaments and toward the establishment of a world court of international justice in resolutions adopted today by the general assembly of the International Christian Endeavor.

"We further lay upon the consciences of the Endeavorers of North America the need of supporting this important question and of adopting for the nation the principles universally adopted for individuals, namely, law, not war," says the resolution advocating the world court.

The disarmament and peace resolution declares:

"Since war settles absolutely nothing, it is out to settle and unsettle practically everything else, Christian Endeavorers call upon the government of the United States to take effective steps to bring about a limitation of the dangers of war with the ultimate object of eliminating it entirely.

"We ask congress to support every effort that promises to bring about international limitation of armaments or that will create a spirit of friendliness among the nations of the earth, to the end that by truth speaking and fair dealing and even handed justice and wise generosity the suspicions and misunderstandings which have so often been the cause of war in the past may vanish forever."

The resolution points out that 150,000 Christian Endeavorers went overseas during their tour of a large proportion of its 4,000,000 members are of draft age.

SOVIET RUSSIA DEMANDS CHINA RELEASE DOSSER

MOSCOW, July 7.—(A. P.) Foreign Minister Tchitcherin has addressed a note to the Chinese ambassador similar to his recent communication of protest to the British envoy, concerning the arrest at Hong Kong of the Russian citizen Dosser.

Referring to the new Russo-Chinese treaty and sovietia's numerous declarations with regard to renouncing her right to exercise the extra-territorial privileges enjoyed in China by the czarist government, the foreign minister points out that handing over Dosser for trial before a mixed court is not only illegal in view of the charges preferred against him, but also a direct infringement of the treaty.

He demands that China take immediate adequate measures to secure Dosser's release, placing on trial those responsible for his arrest.

Christian Takovsky, soviet charge d'affaires in London, left for England by airplane yesterday after a long conference with the government concerning Russo-British relations.

MARSHFIELD BRIDE WITHOUT COUNTRY

PORTLAND, Ore., July 7.—Two parties of deportees were taken out of Portland today. Eight persons were started for Vancouver, B. C., and five for New York to sail for Europe.

One member of the New York party was virtually without a country. Gertrude Meggs, native of Wales, came to this country to marry M. H. Mears of Marshfield. Under the new law she did not gain citizenship but her marriage lost her citizenship in Great Britain. A special ruling allowed her to return to England. Her moral conduct after her marriage was the cause of her deportation.

LEGION CHARGES FLAG DESECRATED

LA GRANDE, Ore., July 7.—Charges of desecrating the American flag were placed with the justice of the peace here yesterday against George Noble and Clyde Bloom by Gus Palmer, commander of the La Grande post of the American Legion. The complaint alleges that Noble and Bloom tore down and mutilated a flag placed as a decoration on one of the main street of La Grande.

Wall Street Report

2 ARMY PLANES FLY FROM TACOMA TO MEDFORD IN FIVE HOURS TIME

TACOMA, July 7.—(A. P.) In an effort to make sure of a one-day hop from Tacoma to San Diego, Lieutenants C. V. Haynes and John W. Benton of the United States army air service took off today from the Camp Lewis field in the bright light of a full moon at 2:30 a. m., one hour earlier than they originally planned. With Lieutenant Haynes as Staff Sergeant Fred Kelly as mechanic, while Private P. J. Maughan was with Lieutenant Benton.

Stops were planned at Medford, Ore., at about 4 a. m. and at Grassy field, San Francisco, about 1:30 o'clock, allowing ample daylight for the remainder of the flight to San Diego. The two planes have been used extensively in the summer training maneuvers at Camp Lewis and are about worn out. The flight was planned to get new motors for the planes after which the fliers will return to Tacoma for the summer. (The planes arrived in Medford at 7:30 a. m. Monday and after refueling continued southward.)

CAMPERS CARELESS ON JULY FOURTH

E. J. Rodgers, forest ranger stationed in the Lake of the Woods region, was in the city yesterday in connection with his official duties, and left information at the Crater National forest service office concerning careless campers and smokers in the Lake of the Woods region on the 4th of July.

On that day, he states, he patrolled a 20-mile section of the road and in the two hours' time it took him to cover six small fires caused from cigarette stubs, which, still being in a stage of incipency, were quickly put out, but if they had been allowed to burn, would have turned into serious fires.

Besides the six cigarette fires he also observed three camp fires, which had been left burning by careless campers. As yet no persons have been arrested for violation of the fire laws, as their identity at present, is unknown.

New Development of Prospect Is Forecasted

It is reported that survey crews of the California Oregon Power company have been actively engaged in reconnaissance work in the vicinity of Prospect the past month. In addition to the survey parties a foundation investigation crew of several engineers has been making studies in this vicinity, it is said.

This activity on the part of the Cal-Ore concern would seem to indicate that the next big power development of the company is destined to take place on the north fork of the Rogue River not far from the present Prospect plant.
