

STEPHEN MATHER GOES TO C. LAKE, BACK TOMORROW

Stephen T. Mather, director of National Parks, arrived in the city this forenoon from Portland and Rainier National Park to visit Crater Lake National Park on his annual tour of inspection. Immediately upon arrival in the city he left for the park accompanied by Colonel C. G. Thompson, superintendent of the park. Where he will spend today and tomorrow forenoon returning tomorrow evening about 8 o'clock to spend two hours in the city before resuming his journey to Yosemite National Park and thence back to Washington, D. C.

While at Rainier National Park and also at Portland, Mr. Mather was in company with Hubert Work, secretary of the interior. Mr. Mather related that while at the park secretary Work experienced his first sleigh ride with the motive power furnished by dogs, even though he had been in Alaska many times where dogs are the only practical mode of transportation.

Tomorrow evening at 8:30, Mr. Mather will be entertained by the directors of the chamber of commerce and a few other prominent Medford men, in the Elks club dining room. The directors had planned to hold this meeting with Mr. Mather this noon at the Hotel Medford but this plan was given up when it was learned that he had made arrangements to go for Crater Lake national park at once on his arrival here this forenoon, and the affair at the Elks club was substituted.

MONKEY JUDGE ISSUES APPEAL FOR FAIR PLAY

DAYTON, Tenn., July 9.—(A. P.)—A desire that those concerned with the Scopes evolution case "divest themselves of all ambition to establish any particular theory for personal gratification, and that we all constantly inquire for the eternal truth" was expressed by Judge John T. Raulston today upon the eve of the trial.

The statement follows:

"I approach my duties in the trial in the Scopes case with a deep consciousness that the issues are profound. I am concerned that those connected with this investigation shall divest themselves of all ambition to establish any particular theory for personal gratification and that we all constantly inquire for the eternal truth.

"If man, without inspiration, attempts to delve into the mysteries of God, he finds himself overwhelmed in perplexities.

"Therefore, I am much interested that the unerring hand of him who is author of all truth and justice shall direct every official act of mine."

COAST CARAVANS OF ELKS JOIN AT GRANTS PASS

SALEM, Ore., July 9.—Two automobile caravans of Elks enroute to the national convention in Portland will be escorted through the state by the state traffic department during the week-end, Chief State Traffic Inspector T. A. Rafferty announced today.

A caravan of 25 or 30 cars of Eureka and Crescent City Elks, traveling over the Redwood highway, is due at the state line Saturday noon, where they will be met by officers of the state traffic department. A Bakersfield caravan of 55 cars traveling over the Pacific highway is due at the southern Oregon state line at 4 o'clock Saturday afternoon.

Chief Rafferty will attempt to bring the two caravans together at Grants Pass so they may travel together the remainder of the trip to Portland.

While traveling in California the caravans will be escorted by the California traffic department.

They are expected to reach Salem late Sunday.

DAYTON, Tenn., July 9.—(A. P.)—An investigation of the living costs in Dayton and especially the rates of the Dayton hotel has been made by the city commission. It was brought out last Friday the hotel will assess its guests eight dollars a day for rooms and meals.
