

### NEW BUILDINGS IN CITY TOTAL OVER \$200,000

Thirty residences and many business buildings valued at over \$200,000 are in the course of construction in the city of Medford, according to building permits issued by the city building department during the past two months. The building costs range from \$1500 to \$5000 with the cost of the greater part averaging in the neighborhood of \$3000 or a little over.

The residences which are being built are given below with the location of each and the name of the builder.

Dr. R. H. Elliott is building a 5000 house on Corning court, Donald McKee, a \$5000 home on the corner of Geneva and East Main streets; John Moffat, a \$3000 home on Sleekly Heights; Edith and Cecil Clarke, a \$4000 home near the Hillcrest road; Max GeBauer, \$3500 frame dwelling on Corning court, W. E. Rowley, a \$2000 cottage on North Lexington; Carroll Bertson, a \$3500 bungalow in the Kenwood addition; J. E. Soltes, a \$2500 residence on South Tripp street; Victor C. Secher, a \$2000 home on Cedar Anne avenue; Frank Patterson, a \$1000 cottage on East Peach street; H. C. Glasecock, a \$1500 cottage on Edwards and Beatty; Russell Sherwood, a \$3500 home on 13th and Nextown; Mrs. F. E. Wahl, a \$6000 residence on Reddy avenue; St. A. Wood, a \$2500 home on Cottage street; L. Young, a \$2300 residence on the west side of Lincoln street; Carl Jones and J. Haydon on Liberty and N. Main streets, a \$2000 cottage; Miles Gamble, \$600 duplex apartment house on West Main; J. J. Clark and A. J. Sharp, a \$1000 cottage on South Peach; O. L. Cornwell, two \$2000 on Quince street each costing \$2000; E. J. Feldman, a \$5000 home on North Central; W. E. Thomas, a \$2500 duplex apartment house on North Grant street; George Iverson, a \$1500 cottage on West 9th; Charles A. Wilson, a \$500 cottage on South Central; F. J. Wilmot, a \$3000 home on West Jackson; W. D. Hazel, a \$1500 cottage on the north side of West 9th; (Maude M. Houston, a \$2000 home on Pennsylvania avenue.

Beside the above residence permits, innumerable permits were granted for repairs and improvements on houses already constructed.

During these two months permits for the construction of business structures were more noticeable than the former months preceding. During May and June, E. C. Jerome was granted a permit to construct a concrete business structure on West Main near Riverside at a cost of \$6000; L. Cornwell was granted a permit to build a concrete structure on South Riverside near Main at a cost of \$7000; John W. Johnson, a permit to erect a \$8000 concrete garage at the corner of Eighth and Bartlett streets; Earl Wahl, a permit to build a \$4000 concrete structure on 6th street near the post office; John Billings, a \$6500 garage on south Riverside; and the River Valley Canning company a \$7000 warehouse at the end of South Front street.

The buildings mentioned above are all in the course of construction with some nearly completed and tenanted by business concerns.

### HUSBAND SAYS OPENING GRAVE WASTE OF TIME

SEATTLE, July 10.—In a statement published here today, King County Coroner Corcoran declared that if Mrs. Crawford E. White was given poison it must have been of a rare kind known to few people. Corcoran conducted an inquest into the death of Mrs. White whose body was found with a bullet wound in her right temple in her home here August 25, 1925. Mrs. Mary Sjoblom of Astoria, Ore., mother of the dead woman, who Wednesday obtained a court order to have the body exhumed, asserted that she believed her daughter was poisoned and then shot.

Opening of the grave of Mrs. White will not disclose anything that was not brought out at the coroner's inquest, declares her husband.

ASTORIA, Ore., July 10.—(A. P.)—In the light of evidence in possession of attorneys, the discovery of poison in the stomach of Mrs. Crawford E. White, who was killed in Seattle two years ago would constitute a strong link in the proof of murder, counsel for Mrs. White's family declared here today. An order for exhumation of the body and analysis of the vital organs was issued yesterday in response to a petition of Mrs. White's mother, Mrs. Mary Sjoblom.

While J. O. Erickson, former Clatsop county district attorney, is continuing to handle the Astoria investigation, C. W. Robinson, criminal law expert, has left for Seattle to further probe the mystery of the woman's death in that city. The exhumation of the body may be delayed several days pending investigations of Robinson in Seattle.

In the contention of relatives that Mrs. White was poisoned and then shot to give her death the appearance of suicide, the bullet wound is in the left temple and an attempt will be made to show that it entered at an angle which made it impossible for Mrs. White, who was right-handed, to have fired the shot. It is also the contention of Erickson that the body was railroaded to the grave.

### STATE CHAMBER COMMERCE GETS SECY'S SUPPORT

EUGENE, Ore., July 10.—E. Eugene Chadwick of Eugene was today unanimously elected president of the State Association of Secretaries of Chambers of Commerce of Oregon at the closing meeting of the members of the association. Other officers chosen were: Earl Reynolds of Grand Rapids, vice president; E. R. Morris of Portland, secretary-treasurer; W. A. Reid of Corvallis, J. H. Fuller of Ashland, W. D. B. Dodson of Portland, W. W. Phillips of Hillsboro and F. A. Fullerton of Milton, directors.

Retiring officers are J. H. Fuller of Ashland, president, and W. A. Reid of Corvallis, secretary-treasurer.

The secretaries in business session today voted to support the state chamber of commerce and to give whatever assistance is needed in the plan for financing the organization. The finance plan, as presented by W. G. Ide, of the state chamber, is that approximately 25 counties in the state, outside of the Portland territory, sell 100 memberships each, at \$5 per year. This will give \$12,500 per year or \$25,000 for the two year period. This fund is to be used for promotion work, and for the services of I. E. Vining of Ashland, president of the organization. The support of the secretaries was given following a long discussion. The drive for members will be staged by the state chamber in each county.

Added to the \$25,000 for the two year period will be a fund of \$45,000, which the Portland chamber of commerce proposes to raise for land settlement work of the state chamber. This will be a sum apart from the administration fund, it is said. The publication, "Oregon Business," will also be continued.

During the early morning session Oregon as a national playground was discussed at the roundtable meeting. Extension of highways and exploiting of Oregon's recreational spots was stressed. Utmost attention should be paid to the tourist, the secretaries agreed.

### ENGLISH PASTORS RIDICULE BRYAN'S EVOLUTION IDEAS

LONDON, July 10.—(A. P.)—Some of England's most noted divines and scientists condemn the Tennessee law forbidding the teaching of evolution in a symposium published by the Weekly Nature. These views were assembled by the Weekly Nature because of the trial at Dayton, Tenn., of John T. Scopes for teaching the theory of evolution in attracting as much attention in England as in the United States.

The bishop of Birmingham is quoted by Nature as saying: "As one who values intellectual freedom I am shocked that Anglo-Saxon communities should seek by legislation and prosecution to prevent the spread of knowledge."

"As a Christian I am dismayed by a movement which opposes a reasonable formulation of the Christian faith. The normal, educated, Christian Britain regards the process of evolution as the machinery whereby God created man. Every divine of eminence among us expresses this point of view."

### STOCKMEN WARNED TO LAY UP HAY FOR RESERVE IN WINTER

PORTLAND, Ore., July 10.—Stockmen of the range districts east of the mountains have been notified by C. H. Wade, humane officer of the Oregon Humane Society, who has just returned from the central and south central Oregon districts, that no excuses will be taken next winter if stock is allowed to starve.

"Hay can be purchased at reasonable prices now," said Wade, "and those who fail to take advantage of present conditions will find themselves facing the courts if they allow stock to go hungry when winter comes."

Wade visited the Klamath Falls and Grants Pass rodeos during his trip and forced withdrawal of poorly nourished horses from both. At Grants Pass he found 24 horses, furnished by Alex Tecumseh, an Indian, in such condition that he barred them from the rodeo. While away he inspected between 1100 and 1200 head of stock.
