

# SCHOOL BONDS IN ASHLAND WIN BY LARGE VOTE

ASHLAND, July 10.—In the election held Thursday afternoon to determine the issuance of bonds in the sum of \$105,000 for the erection of two concrete buildings, the one a sixteen-room grade building, the first unit of which (eight rooms) will be built at the present time and the remodeling of the present grade building, the voters have shown a strong preference for the bonds.

There were 381 votes cast, 329 of which voted "yes" and 52 "no." Carrying the property qualification, this was considered quite a strong vote. This means that Ashland will not only have adequate facilities in taking care of her school population, but that when the Southern Oregon Normal is established there will also be adequate facilities for caring for the practice work of the school.

It is planned to entertain the faculty of next week, the Chamber of Commerce and the Civic Improvement club acting as joint hosts.

## FRISCO WOMAN SUES FOR RETURN OF AUTO

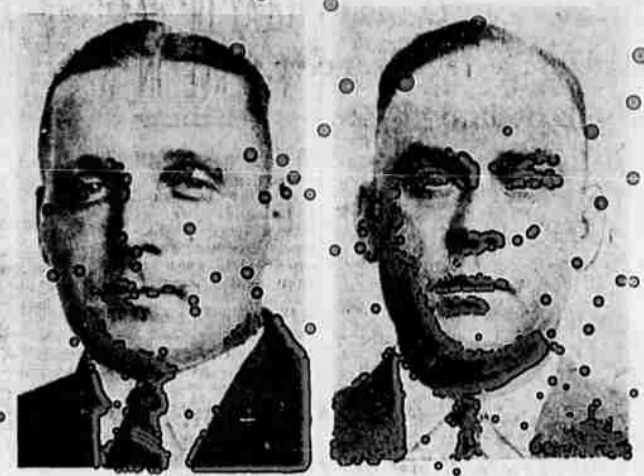
