

### MONKEY JUROR OBJECTS TO BILL, NAME IS CHANGED

COURT ROOM, DAYTON, Penn., July 12.—(By the Associated Press) Court was delayed 25 minutes in opening today for the resumption of the trial of John T. Scopes on a charge of violating the law of Tennessee against teaching evolution theories in the public schools. The delay was caused by the activities of newspaper and motion picture photographers who followed almost everyone in sight. The opening prayer was offered by the Rev. W. A. Moffitt, pastor of the First Baptist church of Dayton. He included petitions for the lawyers on both sides of the case and the newspapermen reporting the trial.

When the jury roll was called William G. Day filed objection to his name being carried officially as "Bill." This was corrected.

The attorney general announced that he wished to question one of the jurors and the other eleven retired while R. L. Gentry was interrogated. The defense objected to the

interrogation but the judge overruled the objection. Attorney General Stewart announced that he had been informed that the juror in question had expressed an opinion as to the guilt or innocence of Scopes. This Gentry denied and said he was "unbiased, unprejudiced and had an open mind." He was permitted to remain on the jury.

Another delay was caused by one juror falling behind, but he came in five minutes later. The indictment was read.

### HOOVER BEATEN BY BRITISH SCULLER

PUTNEY, England, July 12.—Jack Beresford, Jr., English champion sculler, today defeated the challenging oarsman, Walter M. Hoover of Philadelphia in a race over a course of 1 3/8 miles here for the gold challenge cup. Beresford won by three lengths. Hoover, present holder of the cup had previously announced he would return it to America whether he won or lost today.

SEATTLE, July 12.—(A. P.)—While their fiancées waited for their return, Theodore Pinkie and Henry Loren Meyers of Seattle, drowned in the Stillamannish river below Granite Falls, 45 miles northwest of here yesterday while attempting to take pictures of the plucking fators.

Meyers, a senior at the University of Washington, sacrificed his life when he plunged into the roaring water in an effort to save his companion who had slipped off a rock. Both were sucked below the surface in an instant and were dead before rescuers could reach them.

Meyers was engaged to Miss Mabel Pinkie, a sister of Theodore, and they were to have been married after his graduation. Pinkie and Miss Irene McGrath had planned marriage as soon as a home now under construction was completed.
