

GRAIN MARKETING COMPANY TO TRY TO STAGE COMEBACK

CHICAGO, July 14.—(A. P.)—Co-operative marketing of grain will continue under the name of the Grain Marketing company which declined an offer to be dissolved a few days ago and an effort will be made by it to stage a financial comeback.

The directors have voted to return the properties involved to the four companies originally merged, but to request an option for one year allowing the Grain Marketing company to purchase them outright.

Verbal approval of this plan has been given by officers of the four companies, Gray Silver, president of the co-operative industry.

Efforts to keep the co-operative alive through some re-organization plan have already been considered. Nebraska farmers have expressed willingness to start a movement among farmers for the necessary funds.

"Despite obstacles," the directors statement declared "361 company elevators have become stockholders, grain has been handled directly or indirectly from every wheat pool in the United States, except Indiana, and the company now has an opportunity to handle more than 500,000 bushels of its own members' grain from its present membership."

Sidelights on Evolution Trial.

DAYTON, Tenn., July 14.—An enterprising western city is seeking to make capital out of the Scopes evolution trial.

At the court table yesterday, Attorney General Stewart received a telegram from a chamber of commerce secretary in a city beyond the Rockies, suggesting that the state prosecutor change the site of the legal conflict over evolution from Dayton to "the gold spot of America."

"Our magnificent climate, incomparable scenery and a desert which has been turned into a garden of the Gods will be such as to melt the soul of even lawyers, who admit nothing, deny everything and demand proof and (the evolution presumably) will place evolution in the pipe dream class."

"Our outdoor court room seats upwards of 25,000 people. R. S. V. P."

At an early hour today the attorney general had announced no plans for a change of venue.

Dayton was laid in darkness for several hours last night as a result of a break in the town's water main. The municipal power plant is operated by water power and until the break could be repaired the scene of the Scopes trial was without lights. The local shops sold out their supplies of candles which flickered feebly along the chief thoroughfares in the wild, which had sprung up after the intense heat of the day.

The prosecution counsel include two McKenzies, two Hicks and two Bryans. Ben T. McKenzie is a former attorney general of this 18th judicial circuit and is one of the most widely known lawyers in eastern Tennessee. His son, J. Gordon McKenzie is the present judge of the Rhea county court. William Jennings Bryan, Jr., is a Los Angeles attorney.

The "Hicks boys," local practitioners, are graduates of the University of Kentucky of which the defendant is also an alumnus.

MAN REPORTED SLAIN IS ALIVE

DULUTH, Minn., July 14.—(A. P.)—Lynn MacLachlan, reported murdered more than two years ago is alive and living with his wife and two children at Mineola, Minn. G. Ross, county humane officer, was informed today by a telephone message from a woman who refused to give her name.

John R. MacLachlan, father of Lynn, had positively identified the mutilated body of a man found at Aurora two years ago as that of his son.

Mr. Ross' informant said today her husband received a letter two weeks ago from Lynn MacLachlan in which the letter said he was employed by the Ajax Rubber company of Trenton, N. J., and that their home was at Mineola, where Mrs. MacLachlan's parents reside. Pictures of MacLachlan's two children were included in the letter, she said.

SOVIET RUSHING AMMUNITION TO CHINESE FORCES

CRUDE RUBBER DROPS ON NEW YORK MARKET

NEW YORK, July 14.—(A. P.)—Future prices for crude rubber broke sharply today. Smoke rubber for October-December delivery, which was quoted at 96 1/2 cents at the close last night dropped to 89 cents.

Spot rubber also declined about three cents to \$1.57. The announcement yesterday in London that if prices remained at present levels the British government would reconsider the ordinance affecting the export of rubber which was said to have been responsible for the weakness here.
