SPECIAL INQUIRY ORDERED INTO R. R. SYSTEM OF WEST

WASHINGTON, July 14.—(A. P.)—Taking cognizance of petitions of western railroads for rate increases the inter-state commerce commission today ordered special inquiry into the agricultural and transportation system of the west. The hearings will begin at Chicago September 1, before Chairman Aitchison of the commission. Petitions for increases were filed as briefs in answer to the commission's inquiry under the Hoch-Smith resolution which directed a revision of the general rate structure if the commission found such a step necessary. The commission declared it should first confer with the western districts for the reasons: To determine what products of agriculture including livestock are affected by depression. To determine whether any rates, fares or charges, either on particular classes or kinds of commodities or classes of traffic in particular sections or between particular localities may lawfully be used or required to be increased and if so to what extent in order to compensate for such rate reductions, if any, as may be found proper. To determine whether any rates, fares or charges may lawfully be authorized to be increased in order to affect such increases in the revenues of western carriers as may be found proper. State commissions are co-operating in the inquiry but the notice today invited representatives of all other interested to participate. Carriers were notified to be ready to go on at the first hearing submitting their statistics on operations, showing earnings and traffic since 1923.
