

3 MORE FIRES REPORTED BUT NONE SERIOUS

By all of the forest fire reported in various parts of Douglas county were under control today, it was announced this morning. Of the 22 fires reported yesterday on the Umpqua national forest, all are extinguished or under control with the exception of two, one being located on Black creek, a tributary of Little river, and the other on Grassy ranch eight miles northwest of Capuchee.

BEND, Ore., July 14.—Paulina prairie, 26 miles south-southwest from Bend, was reported a new fire at 10:20 o'clock this morning. The blaze is being attended by state forces according to a report received at the Douglas National Forest headquarters from Humidity at noon registered 50 degrees, rather high and favorable for the fire fighters, say official reports.

EUGENE, Ore., July 14.—Two class A forest fires in the Stupka national forest were reported to the local office of the forest service today by M. Hobart Durbin, ranger in the Gardiner and Umpqua river districts.

The fires are small, though potentially great, according to the forest officials.

Is Drowned Fighting Fire.
VANCOUVER, B. C., July 13.—While battling a forest fire raging over the timber limits of the Bevan Lumber company near Cumberland, B. C., on Vancouver island yesterday, Harry Corbell, president of the Lumberland Great War Veterans association, fell into a thum carrying water to a power house of the Canadian Collieries and was drowned.

REFUSE TO MAKE REPORT ON MOB JAP EXPULSION

SALEM, Ore., July 14.—W. A. Delsell, secretary of Governor Pierce, who, with Charles A. Gram, state labor commissioner, investigated the Japanese labor trouble at Toledo, Ore., today that he believed it would make no formal report to the governor.

"At present," said Delsell, "the situation is quiet. The Pacific Lumber company is employing all white men in its mill and I don't think, in fact, that since the deportation of last Sunday, that a Japanese will go into the community. What will be done in the way of prosecution of the citizens who took the Japanese out of the community I don't know. The company talks of taking the case to the federal courts and whether that can be done I do not know. Barring agitation, I think the affair will blow over and peace settle upon the community."

Labor Commissioner Gram would have nothing to say, explaining that he was sent by Governor Pierce to investigate, and that anything given out for publication should come from the governor.

PRESIDENT BUSY AT SWAMPSCOTT

SWAMPSCOTT, Mass., July 14.—(A. P.)—President Coolidge is finding a steadily growing calendar. His reflection upon leaving Washington that the cares of the presidential office do not permit any extended vacation is proving true.

This afternoon Mr. Coolidge will receive members of the executive council who served with him during his term as governor of this state.

Later this week the president has engagements to receive the new minister from Haiti and to entertain also the French minister of foreign affairs who will be guest at luncheon. John Hay Hammond, a close friend of the president, who is spending the summer at Gloucester, near here, will be guest at the same time.

BROKERS PLEAD GUILTY, SENTENCED ONE YEAR

NEW YORK, July 13.—George W. Field and George W. Morse, former heads of two brokerage firms, which failed for a total of \$2,200,000 in 1922, today were sentenced in federal court to serve one year and one day each in Atlanta prison for bucketing customers' orders. Their trial began last week, but before it ended, both pleaded guilty.
