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### Mrs. Fiske Heads All-Star Company In "The Rivals"

When a company of dramatic artists of the outstanding importance of the one now on tour personating Richard Brinsley Sheridan's English comedy, "The Rivals," visits this city, it will most certainly make an epochal event. Very rarely, indeed, are so many players of really great distinction brought together in one company. The public interest extended in the majority of cities they have visited this season has exceeded that accorded any similar tour in many years.

Medford has reason for self-congratulation that this all star company will be seen in "The Rivals" on Thursday, July 23, matinee and night, at the Hunt's Craterian theater. It has just finished playing four cities in California, and will play four cities in Oregon—Medford, Eugene, Salem and Portland.

When one considers that Messrs. George C. Tyler and Hugh Ford have projected a combination of one of the three comedies in the English language, (with the exception of Shakespeare's plays), that have retained their popularity which were written within Sheridan's time, and artists of the fame of Mrs. Fiske, Chauncey Olcott, Thomas A. Wise, James T. Powers, Lotus Robb and several others of scarcely less note, it is not difficult to realize the double reason for the extraordinary popularity of the present tour.

### RANGE DISPLAYS BY LOCAL SHOPS

Following the "Do You Love Your Wife" advance publicity which provided Medford people with many opportunities for guessing the solution, the three firms sponsoring the novel scheme are displaying in their windows a profusion of electric ranges.

### THRILL SLAYER STILL A LARGE, BUT TRAIL HOT

NEW YORK, July 15.—(A. P.)—While some authorities are expecting the apprehension of Philip Knox Knapp, accused thrill slayer, in the city, up state officials are continuing search for him in a dozen cities and towns. District Attorney Weeks of Nassau county said yesterday he believed Knapp was hiding not far from the scene of the murder of Louis Panella, Hempstead taxicab driver.

"I am convinced it is but a matter of hours before he is located," Mr. Weeks said.

The prosecutor made public a letter written by Knapp on the stationery of an Albany hotel.

"I don't think it would be wise to be seen in New York City again," it said. "I guess I'll keep the old bus up in this part of the country for a while."

Mr. Weeks believes the letter was designed to throw pursuers off the track.

The letter made public by Mr. Weeks contained suggestions that Knapp was bootlegging again. It was written July 8; to a corporal at Mitchell field. It begins:

"At last I've settled in the old game again. I came down last night on my first trip, not to New York any more, but from just above Plattsburg to Albany and everything seems to be breaking right so far. When I got in New York last week, Wednesday night, everything seemed to go wrong, for I lost a young fortune in 190's in a sitting at stud poker in the Pennsylvania hotel. One of the old gang was

there, and in the mood I was in then I was easily persuaded to join him again."

### CLAYTON HAMILTON, EMINENT DRAMATIC CRITIC TO LECTURE

In connection with the Sheridan Festival, which is signalled by a revival of "The Rivals" with a brilliant cast headed by Mrs. Fiske, an address will be delivered at the Craterian tomorrow at 4:30 p. m. by Mr. Clayton Hamilton, among the foremost on the roster of the American experts on the theater. The Sheridan revival is undertaken in commemoration of the 150th anniversary of the original production of "The Rivals" by Richard Brinsley Sheridan.

Associated with Professor Brander Matthews in the department of dramatic literature at Columbia university, Mr. Hamilton became known some twenty years ago as one of the ablest lecturers in his field. For periods of varying length he was dramatic critic of "The Forum," the "Bookman," "Everybody's Magazine," and "Vogue." His best known books are: "Materials and Methods of Fiction, 1908," "The Theory of the Theater, 1910," "Studies in Stage Craft, 1914," "On the Trail of Stevenson, 1915," "Problems of the Playwright, 1917," "Manual of the Short Story, 1918." Seen on the Stage, 1920, "Conversations on Contemporary Drama, 1924."

During the vacation of Miss Betty Brown, regular organist at the Hunt's Craterian theater, the place will be filled by Raymond Ballard, of Seattle, until recently organist at the Chamber and Liberty theaters in that city. Miss Brown will be away for a month, leaving on her vacation today.

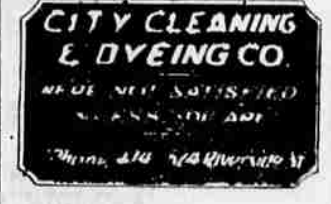
