

### BEAUTY DOCTORS MUST HAVE STATE LICENSE AUG. 1

It will be a violation of the law to engage in hair dressing, facial massage or treatment of the skin after July 31, 1925, without a state license. The office of the state board of health is receiving applications and it is absolutely necessary that all operators file at an early date. Anyone who has been actively engaged in cosmetic therapy six months prior to July 31, 1925 will be entitled to a license by exemption. Those applying at once can receive a license without examination. All those applying after July 31, 1925, will be required to take an examination. Applications should be made directly to the secretary of the state board of cosmetic therapy, 301 Fitzpatrick building, Portland, Oregon.

It is estimated that there are over two thousand cosmeticians operating in this state. To properly take care of the licensing thereof means a great deal of work and it will therefore be well to get applications in at as early a date as possible. No cosmetician will be allowed to operate after July 31, 1925, without a license.

They are to transfer to the gasoline schooner Boxer at Nome, Alaska, for their arctic journey. Sylvester is to be principal of the Point Barrow government school and supervisor of the Far North Reindeer and Commercial Store company, operated by natives. Miss Hodson is to be assistant teacher in the school.

### DEMPESEY RETURNS, WANTS TO FIGHT WILLS NEXT YEAR

NEW YORK, July 16.—(A. P.)—George L. (Tex) Rickard, announced today that Jack Dempsey, heavyweight champion, had been signed to fight Harry Wills, negro challenger, for the heavyweight crown.

Rickard said he signed a formal contract with the champion today, the date of the meeting being left open.

"It will be impossible to stage it this year," the promoter said, "but I expect it to come off by September of next year. Dempsey expressed his willingness to meet Wills at any time."

Colonel John J. Phelan, chairman of the license committee of the athletic commission expressed complete surprise at Rickard's move in signing Dempsey.

"I can't believe that Rickard would dare to tangle with Dempsey in view of the commission's edict that promoters must refrain from negotiating with ineligible boxers," he said. "Dempsey himself must come before the commission on his own volition and apply for a license before any promoter can dicker with him. Before he is granted a license however, he must agree to meet Harry Wills without restrictions."

NEW YORK, July 16.—(A. P.)—Jack Dempsey, back from Europe with a cough, is ready to defend his title. He says he expects to meet Gene Tunney, American light-heavyweight champion, or Bartley Madden in the fall and Harry Wills, negro challenger, next year.

Floyd Fitzsimmons of Chicago, is here hoping to arrange a match between Dempsey and Tunney, Madden or some other heavyweight at Michigan City, Ind., on Labor Day.

Dempsey on this bride, the former Estelle Taylor, motion picture actress, were greeted by a delegation of boxing notables and friends upon their arrival upon the liner Homeric last evening. They intend to remain in New York for a week and will then leave for the Pacific coast.

The champion caught cold in Brighton, England, but he assured friends that inside of two months he would be ready to fight. He does not want to tackle Wills this year, as he thinks he should at least have one warm up battle first.

He thinks his differences with the New York state athletic commission will be adjusted soon as he feels ready to go through with the Wills fight. The commission recently barred Jack Kearns, the champion's manager, from the Greb-Walker fight, because he would not arrange a Wills-Dempsey bout.

"I expect to fight this year," said the champion. "I'm always ready to fight. I don't think anybody believes I fear any man living."

"Mrs. Dempsey is not trying to stop me from fighting," said the champion. "In fact, she admits she can't stop me."

### IRA DERN KNOCKS OUT B. EDWARDS

PORTLAND, Ore., July 15.—Ira Dern, Salt Lake wrestler, knocked out Billy Edwards, Kansas City in the second "round" of their wrestling match here last night. Edwards was awarded the match.

Dern took the first fall in eight and a half minutes and about 25 minutes after they had resumed wrestling Dern landed on Edwards' chin with a husky right and Edwards dropped to the mat insensible.

Referee Klank in awarding Edwards the decision declared Dern's act the worst foul he had ever seen committed in a wrestling match.
