

### CONVICTED MEN TO BE SENTENCED ON TUESDAY, NEXT

The jury in the trial of B. J. Hodges of Klamath Falls, charged with the sale of liquor while armed, returned a verdict of guilty, shortly before noon.

Sentence will be passed next Tuesday morning, by Circuit Judge C. M. Thomas, upon T. E. Edy, local junk dealer, convicted Tuesday, after short deliberation by the jury, of a statutory offense involving a ten year old Gold Hill girl. A motion filed this morning by the attorney for Edy, asking that the verdict be set aside on technical grounds, was denied by the court. A maximum sentence of 15 years can be imposed upon Edy.

R. Dawson, found guilty Wednesday, on an indictment charging "aiding and abetting in the sale of liquor while armed," will also be sentenced Tuesday morning. Dawson was convicted in less than five minutes. An appeal to the supreme court will probably be taken in his case.

The jury in the trial of B. J. Hodges, alleged partner of Dawson's, began deliberations this morning at 10 o'clock. The state, in its opening statement, said the evidence would show that Hodges had ridden in an auto from Keno, Klamath county, with a revolver in a holster over his shoulder, and that when he made a delivery of a keg of liquor at "The Hut," a refreshment parlor located near Camp Jackson on the Crater Lake highway, he had removed the gun, and left it in the front seat of the car. When Hodges, the state claims, delivered a keg of liquor in the back room, he was placed under arrest. The defense said it would prove that Hodges was not implicated in the alleged transaction in any way.

The trial of Mrs. R. Dawson and Mrs. B. J. Hodges, wives of the two men, will probably be called this afternoon.

### RANCHER FINDS GOLD IN BUCKSHOT GRAVEL

Joseph Williams, who resides a short distance east of Medford, reports that he recently found a small amount of gold while panning some buckshot gravel on his ranch. The gravel, which he panned is very similar to that used on the Crater Lake highway, and has very much black sand in its makeup.

Mr. Williams, who has prospected for many years in southern Oregon, thinks the gravel is gold bearing, and furthermore declares he will find it in paying quantities.

### MERCURY SOARS HERE, YESTERDAY'S MAXIMUM 103.5

The present heat wave, which reached a climax yesterday afternoon with a maximum of 103.5, making it the hottest day in the month so far, and this morning's early minimum of 69 was the highest minimum of this year so far, presaging another very hot day, but a brief, heavy shower accompanied by a wind squall about 6 a. m., together with an expected cloudiness and haziness throughout the day was expected to keep the temperature lower than that of yesterday.

However, such was not the case, as it seems the rain only fell in the Roxy Anne district east of the city, and the mercury continued to rise, accompanied by a high humidity, until at 1 o'clock this afternoon it stood at 101 degrees, which was three degrees higher than the temperature at the same hour yesterday.

General opinion was that last night from early evening on until early this morning was the hottest night of the present season, because of the prevailing high humidity, and quite a number of citizens declared that it was one of the hottest nights they had ever known in Medford's history.

Most citizens complained that they were unable to sleep last night on account of the heat.

The maximum temperature of yesterday, 103.5, was reached at 3:30 p. m., and it continued very warm until at 2 a. m. the minimum of 69 was reached, remaining thereabouts until 4:30 a. m., when the mercury began to rise again.

A slight breeze at times during the day, especially this afternoon made the weather more bearable.

### BUZZARD INDIANS ON THE WAR PATH

RIO JANEIRO, Brazil, July 16.—(A. P.)—Dispatches to newspapers here state that a tribe of Indians known as the Urubus, meaning buzzards, are on the war path and have swooped down from their mountain homes in the interior of the state of Maranhao, killing four people and pillaging property in the thinly populated coffee and farming region of the district.

The inhabitants are asking aid from the federal government as the farm houses of the scattered settlers are far apart and the state police force is not sufficient to afford full protection.

### INDIANA PASTOR DESERTS FAMILY FOR THIRD TIME

SOUTH BEND, Ind., July 16.—(A. P.)—Wilson Culp, former Ohio pastor, who twice deserted his wife and nine children, only to be forgiven each time, has again left his family.

Culp and his sister-in-law left their homes last spring and went to Chicago, but returned when Mrs. Wilson Culp obtained a warrant charging non-support. When the latter refused to prosecute each returned to their homes begging forgiveness. Their requests were granted and each promised not to do it again. However, they are believed to have broken their promise and Mrs. Wilson Culp believes they have fled to Mexico.

On a previous occasion, when Mr. Culp was in charge of a church in Zenia, Ohio, he is said to have run off with a choir singer, only to be returned and sentenced to the work house on a charge of non-support. A similar charge is now pending.
