

### NOTED DRAMATIC ARTISTS TO APPEAR IN FAMED COMEDY

These players have combined to make a tour of the United States and Canada under the management of George C. Tyler and Hush Ford, in commemoration of the 150th anniversary of the original production of the play, "The Rivals" is one of the three comedies which are the only survivors

of the thousands written between the death of Shakespeare and 1890, which in any sense can be considered favorites of the stage today. "The School of Scandal," by Sheridan, is second, and "The Storms to Conquer" by Oliver Goldsmith, the third. Sheridan's wit, humor and racy spirit live today because he wrote, not for a day but for all time.

The text of the play used in the present production is approximately as Sheridan wrote it, the restoration by Harrison Grey Fiske, after comparison with various prompt books of celebrated actors, being virtually complete. The play is staged by Mrs. Fiske.

Undoubtedly this is a combination of the most distinguished dramatic artists of this country, who are presented in a comedy that has charmed the theatrical world for a century and a half. America may not again witness such an illustrious aggregation in many years to come.

### Opening Tomorrow 20th Century Grocery Liberty Market

Medford is to have two more up-to-the-minute stores—the second 20th Century grocery in this city and the Liberty market, owned by Emil Peck—both to be located at the corner of Main and Holl streets and to be opened tomorrow, Saturday morning.

In December, 1922, the first 20th Century grocery was opened in Medford in charge of T. W. Wilson and the business has increased to the extent and the proprietors have such faith in Medford that they have opened a second store to be in charge of George Richardson, who has been managing the Ashland store.

The company also opened the Ashland store and one in Grants Pass since starting the first store here. There are now 55 20th Century groceries on the coast.

Mr. Wilson was promoted to supervisor of this district some time ago and is here arranging for the opening of the second store tomorrow.

Fred E. Hahn has been the efficient manager of No. 1 store here since Mr. Wilson's promotion.

Emil Peck, who is opening the liberty market with all new modern equipment, has been connected with different markets in Medford for 17 years, and is an expert in his line and is so well known to people generally that further comment is unnecessary.

### GOVERNMENT WILL TAKE ACTION IN NEW COAL STRIKE

SWAMPSCOTT, Mass., July 17.—(A. P.)—The government will take a hand in the anthracite coal field wage negotiations should an agreement not be reached and a strike called on September 1. The program which the government will pursue in the event of a strike was discussed at a three-hour conference here today by President Coolidge and Secretary Davis.

The specific plan of the government was not disclosed. Secretary Davis ventured no opinion as to the outcome of the wage negotiations now under way. He pointed out, however, that the department of labor, through two mediators, was keeping in close touch with the discussion of the miners and operators and was hoping that an agreement would be reached before the present wage contracts expire on August 31.

The secretary came to Swampscott to go over departmental matters and discuss the labor situation generally with the executive before sailing Saturday for Europe.

Significance was given to his visit by the possibility of a deadlock between anthracite operators and miners over a new wage scale, with suspension of operations in the hard coal fields resulting and it was considered likely that Mr. Davis would give a comprehensive report on the situation and his opinion as to what should be done in event of a tieup.

Secretary Davis came to White Court to discuss several departmental matters before sailing tomorrow for England, but the coal situation received particular emphasis during his conference with the executive.

There was no hint by the president of the plan of procedure by the government in case a strike is called.

Mr. Davis will return to this country on August 25, a week before the expiration of the present wage agreement in the anthracite field.

The secretary expects to study industrial conditions in England, a study interrupted two years ago when he was called back by the death of President Harding.

### MEDICAL RESEARCH FIELD WIDENS

LONDON, July 17.—(A. P.)—Other diseases than cancer may yield their secrets to scientific workers armed with the technical methods evolved by Dr. William E. Gye and his hatter colleague, Dr. J. E. Barnard. The suggestion is put forward today by the Lancet, authoritative British medical journal in presenting papers by the two scientists on their recently announced discoveries regarding the causes of cancer.

"New technical methods now made available," it says, "will be applicable to research along a whole enormous front. Diseases like smallpox, encephalitis, foot and mouth disease, and dog distemper may yield their secrets to workers armed with these new weapons."

Thus far nothing has been revealed as to how the methods can be made applicable to the diseases mentioned, but it is believed information may be forthcoming in this respect very soon.
