WILL IRWIN'S SON PREFERS INCOME TO WORK ON RANCH

SAN FRANCISCO, July 18.—(A. P.)—William Hyde Irwin, son of Will Irwin, the author and heir to one-sixth of the million dollar estate of his aunt, Mrs. Elizabeth Augusta Bixler, wants funds from the estate to continue his studies at Stanford university but the administrators of the estate think the youth should go to work on the Union Island ranch in the San Joaquin valley which is part of the Bixler holdings. Differences between the administrators and the legatee were aired in the superior court here yesterday when Irwin told the court that he didn't believe he would develop himself according to his plans if he took hold of the Bixler ranch. Charles C. McIntosh, and Samuel J. Hamilton, administrators of the estate testified they believed young Irwin should obtain a first hand working knowledge of the ranch property instead of doing post-graduate work at Stanford and therefore they had refused to advance funds. Under the terms of the will Irwin received \$1400 a year until he was graduated from Stanford recently. The executors were authorized under the will to furnish such further sums as they deemed necessary. Judge E. P. Shortall continued the case until July 27 and advised attorneys to settle the controversy out of court.

SECY. OF LABOR DAVIS HOPEFUL AVERTING OF COAL WALK-OUT

SWAMPSCOTT, Mass., July 18.—(A. P.)—Having discussed with Secretary Davis the possibility of a tie-up in the anthracite coal industry, due to a deadlock over a new wage scale, President Coolidge went ahead with plans for conferences here with other cabinet officials. It is regarded as certain that Secretary Hoover will be summoned to White Court if the anthracite situation becomes more threatening. Mr. Hoover is now on the Pacific coast. Inasmuch as Secretary Davis has sailed for Europe and will be out of the country until late in August, the commerce department head, on account of his close contact with the situation, naturally is one to whom the president will turn for advice. KLAMATH WOMEN ARE ACQUITTED IN BOOZE TRIAL

The jury in the trial of Mr. and Mrs. R. Dawson, and Mr. and Mrs. R. J. Hodges, all of Klamath Falls, charged with transportation of liquor in an auto, Friday afternoon, after an hour's deliberation, returned a verdict of guilty, against the husbands and acquitted their wives. The women are mothers.

The two couples, will all go on trial Monday morning, and face a jury on a charge of possession of liquor, the last of the indictments brought against them by the last grand jury.

Hodges and Dawson, were convicted this week, at separate trials, of "selling liquor while armed." The trials grew out of the raid of the "Hut," a candy store, established on the Crater Lake Highway, near Camp Jackson, during the National Guard encampment last June. The Hodges and Dawsons were arrested during the delivery of three 10-gallon kegs of moonshine.

It was brought out from the testimony, that the "Hut," was established by the district attorney's office, stocked, and placed in charge of a man by the name of Holbrook with instructions to sell all he could, and buy all the liquor he could.
