LEFTY O'DOUL IS STILL LEADING IN COAST L. BATTING

SAN FRANCISCO, July 20.—(A. P.)—Lefty O'Doul, Salt Lake outfielder, increased his batting average 17 points during the last week's play and continues to lead the Pacific Coast league batters with an average of .422, unofficial figures show. Frank Brazil third baseman for the Seattle Indians, rests in second place with .410 and Paul Warner of the Seals is third with an average of .407.

Rohrer is leading the Portland batters with .366; Wally Hood, Angel outfielder, is high man on his club with .353; Brubaker leads the Oaks with .342; Hoffman, the Senators, with .312, and Warner the Tigers with .299.

YANKEE SPRINTERS RECEIVED MONEY, MEDALS HELD UP

BERLIN, July 20.—(A. P.)—The German amateur athletic board is investigating charges that the American sprinters, Loren Murchison of Newark, N. J., and Charles Paddock of California, received money from sports promoters during their recent participation in German races.

The German sporting authorities will postpone action until the amateur athletics unions of the United States and France have passed upon the charges. Medals won by Murchison Saturday at Cambridge, England, are withheld as a result.

The German amateur athletic board has requested vouchers from sport promoters who say they paid "fees and expenses" to Murchison and Paddock. German newspaper critics say the Americans were anything but modest in their financial requests.

British sporting editors declare the Americans were not giving "exhibitions" in the amateur sense of the word because of the fees and expenses they received in Germany.

ATHLETICS GAIN A FIRMER HOLD, PITTSBURG ALSO

NEW YORK, July 20.—(A. P.)—Major league leaders are entrenched a little better as a result of Sunday's games.

By mauling tactics in St. Louis, the youthful athletes of Connie Mack remained at the top of the American ladder. Fifteen innings were required before they acquired a verdict of 12 to 8. Al Simmons tied the score in the ninth with a home run. Galloway and Sisler also produced four base hits. The Senators toiled on meanwhile, Dutch Reuther gaining a decision over the Indians at Cleveland, 4 to 2.

Detroit subjected the Yankees to a bombardment, 22 hits rolling up a total of 18 runs to 12 collected by the New Yorkers. Pitchers went down like a line of dominoes. Home runs were recorded by Harry Hellmuth and Lou Gehrig, one for each side.

In the National league, Pittsburgh gained half a lap on the Giants, while beating Baltimore in an exhibition game. The Giants failed to take advantage of their opportunity and bowed to Cincinnati, 6 to 4.

BUENOS AIRES, July 20.—(A. P.)—Luis Firpo, the Argentine heavyweight, says that he is anxious for another fight with Jack Dempsey and that the proposed match between Dempsey and Harry Wills displeases him.

Luis has sent the following telegram to Jack: "For the sake of the game it would please me to hear that your bout with Wills is not coming off, because I sincerely believe the Black Panther is more of a wrestler than a boxer. I am going into training very soon and intend to abandon all other business in order to improve my present physical condition with a view to meeting you again in the ring in 1926."

TILDEN DEFEATED IN DOUBLES BY CALIFORNIA MEN

ST. LOUIS, July 20.—(A. P.)—Harvey Snodgrass and Walter Westbrook of Los Angeles are the new national clay court tennis doubles champions, succeeding Robert and Howard Kinsey of San Francisco. The Kinseys won the title last year. The winning California team surprised by eliminating William T. Tilden, II, and A. L. Wiener of Philadelphia, in straight sets yesterday afternoon. The score was 6-1, 6-2, 6-1.

CHICAGO, July 20.—(A. P.)—William T. Tilden, II, who pulled his national championship out of the fire in the fifth set of a furious match with George Lott, Jr., of Chicago in the national clay court tennis championship Saturday at St. Louis may face the young Chicago again this week in the Illinois tennis championship tournament at Skokie club.

Eight of the ten leaders in the national ranking are entered in the state play, only Vincent Richards and Johnny Hennessy of the top ten remaining out of the competition.

William M. Johnston of California and former world's champion, is another entry who may face the present title holder.

Helen Jacobs and Charlotte Host, mer, second and third in the women's Pacific coast ranking, are entries in the women's division.

First and second round matches will be played today.

Farm Bureau Co-operative Exchange Offering Bonds

The Farm Bureau Co-operative exchange is advertising an issue of 7 per cent first mortgage gold coupon bonds at 96 which the directors have placed with Mr. Bevan for distribution among the people of Jackson county.

This organization was incorporated in 1909 and has steadily increased its business with the farmers of the county so that the net profits on the large turnover during the past year were more than sufficient to provide interest on all liabilities.

The directors have executed a trust deed with the Jackson County bank, placing a direct mortgage on all their real estate and assets, and have agreed according to the terms of the deed to deposit monthly in a sinking fund a sufficient amount to cover principal and interest over the ten year period.

The bureau enjoys the business of hundreds of farmer members and thru their cooperative marketing have saved producers of Jackson county, the organization claims.

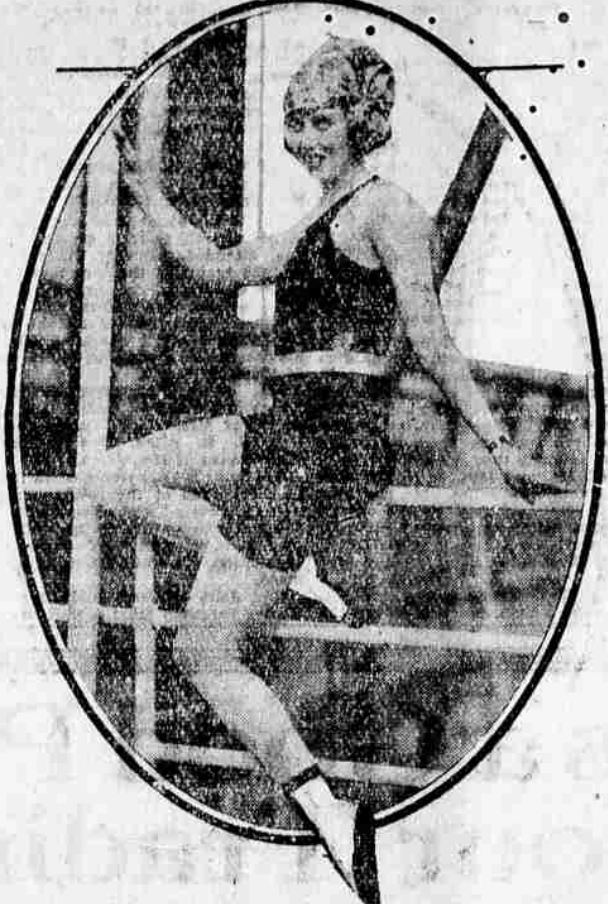
BANKRUPT FIRM STARTS UP AGAIN

CHICAGO, July 20.—(A. P.)—Dean Onativia and company the \$35,000,000 brokerage firm which went into bankruptcy last month, but was rehabilitated through cooperation of creditors and customers, reopened today. The offices were filled with flowers from customers and employees.

"There has been nothing like this in the history of finance," said Jacob M. Loeb, chairman of the customers' committee.

The Chicago stock exchange was to vote today on re-instatement of the firm, which was suspended when bankruptcy petitions were filed. The receivers, out in New York and Chicago were recently discharged when the firm was revived.

RECOVERY OF BODY MAY BRING CROP LOSS TO RANCHERS

YAKIMA, Wash., July 20.—Directors of the Sunnyside irrigation district must decide today whether a mother's anguish over balances the positive damage of shutting off the water from the entire Sunnyside district of over 100,000 acres for the period of a week.

Mark Story, Granger youth, was drowned above the siphon yesterday afternoon while swimming and the body in spite of diligent search, has not been found. Appeals are being made to turn off the water, which would require a week on account of the danger of having the soaked dirt walls collapse if it were done too suddenly, according to Project Manager J. L. Lytle. The crop damage from such action would be large, he considers.

KLAMATH GIRLS ACCUSE BARBER

PORTLAND, Ore., July 20.—Edward Valley, 45, a Portland barber, was lodged in the city jail Friday night on a statutory charge involving June Bradshaw, 14, the older of the two Klamath Falls sisters who were located in this city this week after a search of several days by Klamath Falls and northern California authorities.

COPCO IS BEATEN BY ROGUE RIVER, OWEN-OREGON ALSO

Yesterday afternoon marked the third defeat for Copco in as many games, Rogue River being the administrators of this defeat of 12 to 11. The upstate boys started off in the first inning, scoring one run on three successive errors by Oliver in left field. Copco then retaliated, scoring six runs in their half of the inning. The game saw-sawed back and forth until the seventh inning when the score stood 11 to 10 in the locals' favor, but the visitors touched Dick Miller for two hits, and coupled with two errors netted Rogue River three runs, which won the game. Copco had two men on base in the eighth inning with one out, when Wilkinson hit into a double play, this being the visitors' last opportunity to score.

Two three base hits by Guiley and Oliver, and a single by Hal Miller in the seventh inning made things look pretty bad for Rogue River, but it was only for the time being, as they forged ahead in the next inning with the winning runs.

This was the first game that Dick Miller lost this year and only for the numerous outfield errors the result would have been somewhat different. The Copco outfield was quite weak and it is expected that a few changes will be made within another week.

The Hornbrook and Owen-Oregon baseball game which followed proved to be very much closer, as the home team was beaten by only one point, the score being 4 to 3. Errors were not so numerous on either team, Hornbrook having two and the Double-O nine having three.

Foley pitched a very good game of ball for the lumberjacks; striking out seven men and allowing but five bases on balls, while Jones of Hornbrook struck out eight men and allowed but two bases on balls.

From start to finish the game was replete with action. The score was tied at several different times and it was anybody's game until the last inning had ended.

Valley's bail was set at \$5000, which he was unable to raise.

On request of his attorney his preliminary hearing was set over from today until Tuesday.

WHITE HORSE, Y. T., July 20.—(A. P.)—Dr. George Mack, a member of parliament for the Yukon territory, declared here today that reports of an epidemic of influenza among Indians in the Yukon have been greatly exaggerated.
