LONDON, July 21.—The Morning Post says that the celebrated golfer, Cyril Tolley, former amateur champion, has renounced golf for two years to concentrate upon lawn tennis with the hope of making his tennis as good as his golf and appearing as one of England's champions at Wimbledon. He already is practicing earnestly and experts say he has shown great promise.

He also is frightened about his foot work and lack of speed, but as he has had wonderful luck with golf he hoped the same would be true of his tennis. ## O. A. C. RIFLE TEAM WINS 1ST HONORS AT CAMP LEWIS

TACOMA, July 20.—Thirty-six cadets of the reserve officers training corps, which closes its summer encampment at Camp Lewis Thursday will receive commissions as reserve officers in the army of the United States during the review which will be a part of the visitors' day program at camp tomorrow.

Many more cadets will be commissioned in the reserve when they are graduated at college next year. The 750 cadets in camp are from ten states and represent 17 collegiate institutions.

Commissions and trophies will be presented by Major General William H. Johnston, Camp Lewis commander, at the review in the afternoon.

The "doughboy of the west" rifle trophy for the best shooting of a college team will be presented to the Infantry of the Oregon Agricultural college. The intercollegiate rifle cup goes to the seven high men of the Oregon Agricultural college: E. A. Keeney, S. Waddle, J. L. Hellig, M. D. Newman, H. A. Stearns, G. L. Berry and D. B. McFarland.

Keeney of O. A. C. will be given the first prize for rifle score; Eugene Hicker, University of Washington was second.

## 110,585 VEHICLES ON OREGON'S STATE HIGHWAY JUNE 17

SALEM, Ore., July 20.—Horse drawn vehicles constitute less than one per cent of the total traffic on Oregon's highways, according to a survey conducted by the state highway department on June 17. The survey which covered 175 points on 33 different state highways, accounted for a total of 110,585 vehicles of all descriptions of which only 1952 or .98 per cent were horse drawn.

Passenger automobiles constituted by far the heaviest part of the traffic with a total of 98,599 cars accounted for, or 89.16 per cent of the total. Of this number 71,924 were Oregon cars and 26,665 were cars from other states. A total of 6100 light trucks were accounted for and 3980 heavy trucks. Motorcycles numbered 814.

The heaviest traffic was found at a point on the Tualatin Valley highway, west of the junction near Beaverton where 2319 vehicles were counted during the day, only five of which were horse drawn. Only ten vehicles were counted on the Ochoco highway at its junction with the John Day highway, all of this number being passenger automobiles bearing the Oregon license.

## U. S. RECLAMATION OVER FOR PRESENT

WASHINGTON, July 20.—(A. P.)—Secretary Work, who returned today from a tour of the northwest, declared that inspection of government irrigation projects confirmed the soundness of his reclamation policy.

"There is no need for more reclamation projects until the present ones are put on a sound basis," he asserted. "One-third of the projects are insolvent and one-fourth of them should never have been built. Six thousand farms under government ditch are without occupants and there is no more reason to construct additional projects than there would be to build houses without prospects of tenants."
